

SECRETARY DAVIS EXPOSES LIQUOR SEL- LERS AND ARRESTED

We clip the following from the Charlotte Observer which explains what happened there Monday night when Mr. Davis, Secretary of the Anti-Saloon League, spoke:

Mr. Heriot Clarkson was chairman. After the audience which was a union gathering from all the churches, had sung "Rock of Ages," and Rev. D. H. Robinson, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, had made the invocation, Mr. Davis secured the floor, and proceeded to un- cork me, not quite that, either his sensation. After a general discussion of the situation in the State and after declaring his belief that the Webb bill to prevent the shipping of liquor into dry territory will pass the current session of Congress, he declared, "The worst place in North Carolina for selling liquor by drug stores and clubs is this great metropolitan city of Charlotte."

There was applause, of more or less doubtful appropriateness, which possibly had reference to the climactic phrase of the sentence. Then Mr. Davis added that he knew what he was talking about, proceeded to open a box which sat in front of him, and bade his audience have a look. He took therefrom cigar- ette boxes of questionable-looking liquid which he held up on the table. There he said were five different brands of liquor, each in a different bottle. He then is a pint bottle of rye whiskey which was bought by a citizen of Charlotte without a prescription from the proprietor of a Charlotte drug store for 75 cents.

"Here is a pint of corn whiskey bought by a citizen of Mecklenburg from a local drug store without a prescription for 75 cents. This pint of corn whiskey was bought from the proprietor of a Charlotte club by a citizen of Mecklenburg, who was not a member, for 50 cents. This pint of rye whiskey was bought by a citizen of Mecklenburg from the proprietor of a club of which he is not a member for 75 cents. This bottle of rye whiskey was bought by a citizen of your county from an employe of a club of which he is not a member for 65 cents. This bottle of corn whiskey was bought by a citizen of your city from an employe of a club of which he is not a member for 75 cents."

Mr. Davis stated that with one exception all of these establishments were located on Trade, College and Tryon streets, and most of them near the square. At this point Recorder D. B. Smith, who took down the speaker's remarks, left the hall and, making a complete directory of all the drug stores and clubs on the streets mentioned, incorporated these in three writs known as the capias ad testificandum. Sergeant J. M. Youngblood, Sergeant Joe Orr and Policeman Wal- Orr then waited at the front and side entrances of the Auditorium with these papers until the service was concluded and served them.

The courts in this State have held that a blanket inquiry is of no force. This was the reason for specifying all the establishments which seemed to be brought within the survey of the general indictment. The papers served on Mr. Davis required him to state whether or not he had knowledge of the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors by the following corporations: Manufacturers' Club, Colonial Club, Woodall & Sheppard, Hawley's, Tyrone Drug Company, J. P. Stowe & Co., Reece & Alexander, Hornets' Nest Club, Eagles Drug Company, W. L. Hand & Co., Palmetto Club, R. H. Jordan & Co., Bowen Drug Company, Queen City, East Avenue Drug Company, Royal Acme, Neely & Co., K. K. Blair & Co., and John S. Blake.

Sergeant Youngblood came upon Mr. Davis in the rear of the store, after the last stragglers were leaving the hall. He began to read his document. "That's not necessary," said Mr. Davis. "Well, the law requires me to do it," said the officer. He finished reading it. There was a

hurried consultation of a few seconds among the leading prohibitionists and then the entire party proceeded to headquarters, where Mr. Davis specified three drug stores and five clubs, gave the name of the man who had done the work Saturday and also the names of those who made the sales. Mr. Davis had denied that he had given the purchaser the money with which to buy the goods, or had promised him any. Had it been otherwise, the purchaser, who is a rather well-known Mecklenburger, would be guilty of retailing also.

"The scoundrels have outlived their day of grace," thundered Mr. Davis from the platform, referring to the druggists, "and the city officials ought to shut down on them completely and allow them no license at all." He declared that Charlotte had received more bad advertising from her clubs than all the other towns and cities in North Carolina, though, he added, this was due to the efficiency of the local officers.

February the 15th has been set for the date of his hearing.

Five Eastern Counties Have The Hookworm Dispensaries In Operation

The counties of Johnston, Craven, Gates, Bertie and Beaufort have the State and County Dispensaries in operation for the free examination and treatment of hookworm disease. The work in Johnston county is being conducted by Dr. B. W. Page, assisted by Mr. L. H. Swindell, Microscopist; that in Craven by Dr. C. F. Stroemmer, assisted by Mr. W. C. Riddle, Microscopist; that in Gates county by D. T. F. Hughes, assisted by Mr. J. M. Hiles, Microscopist; that in Bertie by Dr. F. W. Covington, assisted by Mr. E. W. Connor; and that in Beaufort county by Dr. C. J. Priddy, assisted by Mrs. C. I. Priddy, Microscopist. The attending Physicians are the District Directors of the Hookworm Campaign.

Since July the first the dispensary work has been finished in seventeen counties with the results that more than twenty-six thousands of people have been treated, thousands were examined who needed no treatment, and tens of thousands have been acquainted with the disease and taught the essentials of sanitation, neglect of which is responsible for the spread of the disease. The same neglect is also wholly responsible for the spread of typhoid fever.

STUBBS HITS BACK

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 2—Governor Stubbs of Kansas tonight issued a statement in reply to the one given out by Secretary Hilles in Washington yesterday to the effect that President Taft was "being nominated and elected."

Among other things the Governor says, "We have the amazing spectacle of the President's private Secretary trying to stop the rapidly rising 'Roosevelt tide,' and put heart and hope into his associates by claiming the State of Ohio for his chief. 'I have resorts of the most reliable and trustworthy character which indicate that, unless conditions change, at the very least a majority of the Ohio delegates will be opposed to the re-nomination of the President. 'The introduction into Congress of anti-third-term resolution in the same way illustrates the panic-stricken condition of the Democratic leaders. This is caused by the spontaneous insistent demand from all sections of the country and by all classes of people—for Roosevelt's nomination.'"
