Sylvan School Planning New and Larger Things.

For awhile the people of the Sylvan Graded School have considered changes for the improvement of their school facilities. All were agreed on improvements. But as to the best plans for reaching the desired end there was a difference of opinion. All have been zealous in the cause but as there was an almost equal difference of opinion about best plans for procedure it made it difficult to get a plan that would meet all conditions satisfactorily and get the co-operation of the community.

The County Supt. of Schools together with the County Board of Education and the State Supt. of Public Instruction, Dr. J. Y. Joyner, went to Sylvan last Thursday and looked over the situation.

That evening they met in conference with the Coms. of the different departments and interest of the school, and after a free and very fair consideration of all the questions, devised a large and liberal plan to which there was unanimous agreement. The plan is to take in with the Sylvan school the territory between the Sylvan school and Chatham county line and also Lee Point, a small district adjoining Sylvan. Then build a central High School building near the Center or a prominent elevation, known as Flint Hill, and one or more Elementary buildings at other sites in the district in order to put the elementary grades in easy reach of all the small children.

This plan will not only eliminate the serious question of distances for the little children, and give a much larger local tax for school purposes, and also a larger and stronger system, and much better houses and general equipment, but it meets the conditions in a deed of trust that was made by Mr. Isaac Hammer of Kansas, and thus secures a handsome donation valued at about \$300,000.00 for the benefit of the school. The people of Sylvan are to be congratulated on giving up a division of opinion, though a very honest one, and coming together and constructing and accepting this large plan for better things along the very important cause of education for all the children.

This has long been a great community and an educational center. Old Sylvan Academy, the house of which is still standing in a most magnificent grove from which it took its name, has been a beacon light that has shed its rays in benediction upon hundreds of this community and many others. Through this school the older heads of this community have done a great and lasting work in developing strong men and women.

The older and younger prompted by that same spirit of the older, many of whom are gone, to liberate their children from the bondage of ignorance, that took its material form establishing the Sylvan Academy, are now united in pushing greater things. These people have already bought a 90 acre farm so they can give an education that will


