

Proceedings of the County Commissioners.

Graham, N. C., April 1st. The Board of County Commissioners of Alamance County met in the Court House on the above date in regular monthly meeting at ten o'clock a. m. with the following members present:

- Geo. T. Williamson, Chairman, J. E. Stroud, T. B. Barker, E. L. Dailey, W. H. Turrentine

The following business was transacted.

Ordered: That Sam C. Craddock be relieved of one poll tax erroneously listed.

Ordered: That the Treasurer of Alamance County turn over to the Clerk to the Board One Thousand Dollars to be set aside and bonded as a sinking fund for the Bond issue of 1909.

Ordered: That the Treasurer of Alamance County turn over to the Clerk to this Board One Thousand Dollars to be set aside and bonded as a sinking fund for the Bond issue of 1903 same due to be set aside May 1st, 1912.

Ordered: That the County Treasurer be authorized to take up the County notes of Five Thousand Dollars due Virginia Cotton Mill, the Note of five Thousand dollars due the National Bank of Alamance and the note of one thousand dollars due the Commercial and Farmers Bank of Mebane.

Ordered: That W. H. Turrentine, G. Ab Fogleman and Geo. T. Williamson be appointed a committee to investigate the matter of building a bridge across Alamance Creek near Swepsonville and report to this Board at its next meeting.

Ordered: That Chester Freshwater be relieved of Poll and road tax for the year 1912 on account of infirmities.

Ordered: That the Superintendent of roads have the road asked for from Morrums mill to Saxapahaw and leading to Graham and other points, surveyed and see what the change will cost the County.

Ordered: That the County accept the proposition of D. M. Elder and other citizens to build a macadam road from the end of the Alamance bridge to the L. Banks Holt residence in Cobles township with the understanding that D. M. Elder and others who signed the subscription list pay for the construction of said road the sum of Twenty-one hundred dollars and the county to pay the balance. The work to be done as soon as possible.

Ordered: That A. C. Ward be permanently relieved of poll tax and road tax on account of infirmities.

Ordered: That Geo. T. Williamson, W. H. Turrentine and G. Ab Fogleman be appointed a committee to investigate building a bridge across Haw River at the Foust ford below Saxapahaw, N. C. and get the cost of same for Alamance County's part and report to this Board at its next meeting.

Ordered: That Zeb. Isley be allowed ten dollars damages for wheat destroyed by running road through his wheat field in Cobles township.

Ordered: That the Road asked for by citizens in Faucetts Township beginning at a Walnut tree on R. T. Kernodle's land and running through the lands of R. T. Kernodle to a rock in Stoney Creek; thence crossing the creek and connecting with the Burlington road near Brown Pinnix be and is hereby granted.

Ordered: That the Sheriff be authorized to summons three disinterested free holders and lay out a cart way leading from Geo. Crutchfields to the Public Road leading to Saxapahaw; across the lands of Geo. Crutchfield, P. R. Ingold and Joseph May, and assess the damage, if any, and said petitioners to pay damage and cost, if any.

Ordered: That L. L. Thompson be relieved of Graded school tax in Sylvan Graded school same listed erroneously.

Ordered: That the petition for a new road from the Phillips place in Melville township across to the macadam road near the Eaton place be laid over until the next meeting of this Board.

Ordered: That the matter of a Cart way across the lands of Dr. J. W. Page in Cobles township be laid over until the next regular meeting of this Board.

Ordered: That the Sheriff be authorized to have the County Jail repaired and present an itemized account for same to this Board.

Ordered: That J. F. Brooks be relieved of Road tax and poll tax, on account of infirmities, for one year.

Ordered: That Thos Mann be

relieved of road tax and poll tax for one year on account of infirmities.

Ordered: That Lonnie McPherson be relieved of road tax and poll tax on account of infirmities.

Ordered: That Sarah Madkins be allowed \$2.00 per month for two months to be furnished by J. A. Lewis.

Ordered: That G. Ab. Fogleman be authorized to lay out the road across the lands of T. R. Harden and others to the creek near Mr. T. C. Foust's.

Ordered: That G. Ab. Fogleman be authorized to lay off the road across the lands of T. R. Kernodle to Stony creek; thence to the public road leading to Burlington near Brown Pinnix's.

Ordered: That J. B. Gerring, L. I. Cox and J. J. Lambeth be authorized to open the public road in Boon Station Township leading South from Elon College, the said road having been granted by this Board at its meeting in March.

Ordered: That Thomas Store Co. be authorized to furnish Richmond Ruffin in provisions to the amount of \$1.50 per month for two months and present an itemized account with this order attached.

It is ordered that the Assistant Assessors for the year 1912 be allowed for listing the taxes two dollars per day for two days and five cents per name for each entry line on the book list.

The following named persons were appointed as Assistant assessors for the year 1912 to assess taxes:

Ordered: That if any of the Assistant assessors appointed today fail to serve that the Chairman of this Board be authorized and empowered to fill the vacancy.

A petition being presented to the Board of County Commissioners endorsed by the Board of Education asking for a special election to be held in certain territory in Newlin and Patterson township said territory described and bounded as follows to wit: Lying and being in Alamance County in Newlin and Patterson township beginning at the South East corner of Mrs. Minnie Lashleys land or in the old Faettyville road a corner of Sylvan Graded school district line; thence South with said road to the Chatham County line; thence East with the said Chatham County line to where it intersects with the Lee Point Public School District line; thence North with said district line to Cane creek; thence up Cane creek to the mouth of Hunting Branch; thence South and West with boundaries of Sylvan Graded school District line to the beginning. The territory between the Sylvan School and the Chatham line and the Lee Point School thus included to become a part of the Sylvan Graded school, to vote upon the question of levying a special tax in said territory for school purposes.

It is ordered that said petition be and is hereby granted and said election ordered to be held at Lee Point School House in said Territory on the 13th day of May, 1912. The Registration Books for said election will be opened for the registration of voters on the 12th day of April, and will remain open for twenty days (Sundays excepted) and close on the 4th day of May. A new registration for said election is hereby ordered and all persons who live in said territory and wish to vote in said election will be required to register in accordance with the existing law.

James H. Roach is hereby appointed Registrar and S. H. Griffin and M. M. Roach are hereby appointed Judges for said election.

There being no further business the Board adjourned to meet the first Monday in May.
