NO NEWS COMES FROM THE ALLEN PURSUERS

Hillsville, Va., April 4.—Another day's pursuit of the courthouse assassins still at large had brought no news of success from the posses in the mountains late tonight.

Jordan Edwards, one of the Allen kinsmen arrested yesterday charged with giving aid to Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards, the only two outlaws of the band who have not been taken, got a grilling at the hands of the detective chiefs today in the hope that he might tell the whereabouts of his kinsmen. The mountaineer was firm and did not betray them. He scorned an offer that the \$1,500 offered for the men should be his if he gave them up. It developed that he is in Sidna Allen's debt. Detectives have found a great many others in this country in the same plight who fear being suspected of aiding the offenders.

A charge of venne for the trials of the murderers seems certain. Clerk Goad, the only officer of Carroll county court who was not killed in the assassination of March 14, is the principal witness for the prosecution. The Allens probably will not be tried in a court where no one of its officers was a prosecuting witness.

A long distance telephone message was received today from Mt. Airy, N. C., quoting a rural mail carrier as saying he had been told by negroes on his route that a battle had been fought this morning at Volunteer Gap, Va., between mountain detectives and the two uncaptured outlaws who assassinated court officers at Hillsville Va. The story was that the fugitives, Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards, and two detectives had been killed.

Subsequent reports from Mount Airy failed to confirm the report and dispatches from Roanoke, Va. and other points near the Blue Ridge mountains convinced state authorities that the negroes were romancing.

Operation For Grace.
Atlanta, Ga., Mch. 31.—Eugene H. Grace probably will be operated on next Tuesday afternoon for the removal of the bullet which has severed his spinal cord and now lies embedded in the spinal column. This decision was reached today by Grace's physicians, Doctors Turner and Bailey of Newnan, Ga. Grace, it is stated, has not fully decided whether he will undergo the operation.

Several days ago he insisted on such a proceeding, but his improved condition changed his opinion and he now is considering taking a chance on getting well without the operation.
Mrs. Daisy Opie Grace, accused by her husband of firing the shot in an effort to get rid of him and secure his life insurance of \$25,000, today moved from her quarters at a local hotel to a private home in West End. She will remain here in seclusion until the date of the preliminary trial, April 16.

C. O. Teate, an insurance agent, added another chapter to the Grace case today when in a published interview he told how it had been planned between Grace and his wife for each of them to take out \$25,000 life insurance, made payable to each other. According to Teate, Grace took his first at the insistence of his wife, but he told Teate to use him again about July 15 when he would take out \$25,000 insurance on his wife, which she had promised to make payable to him.
Teate says he went to see Grace last week at Newnan, when in discussing the insurance matter, Grace repeated the charges he has previously made against his wife.
