Supreme Court Decisions

Mrs. Cook of Alamance, Gets Di-
vorce And \$40 Alimony

Raleigh, April 17.—In a batch of opinions handed down by the Supreme court this evening, the case of Mrs. Irene Johnson Cook, a prominent Raleigh woman against her husband, John M. Cook, of Alamance county, is probably the most interesting. The higher court affirming the judgment of the lower court in granting her divorce from bed and board and awarding her alimony in the sum of \$40 a month. Chief Justice Clark and Justice Walker filled dissenting opinions, their position being that inasmuch as the husband had made suit for absolute divorce in Alamance county more than a year before Mrs. Cook's action, she should have made her defense and claims in that court. Mr. Cook's action for divorce was on the grounds of living apart for ten years, and Mrs. Cook's on the ground of abandonment.

Still Hunting for Outlaws

Bristol, Va., April 17.—Judge P. Oglesby, attorney for the members of the Allen gang now in jail at Roanoke, returned last night from Hillsville, where he has been for several days making investigations preparatory to the trials of the outlaws. He says the detectives are still in the mountains about Hillsville, prosecuting an aggressive search for Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards. The detectives are firm in the belief that the outlaws are still in the mountains near Hillsville.

Believed That O. S. Moody of Roxboro Was on Ill-Fated Ship

Roxboro, April 17.—It is highly probable that Roxboro furnished one of the victims of the Titanic disaster. A message from Superintendent Cacliran of the Postoffice Department at Washington confirmed the fears of his mother, that Mr. O. S. Woody, who was in the postal sea service was on board the Titanic. He had written his mother, when he last sailed from New York that he would return on the Titanic. The mother is almost crazed with grief and suspense, since hearing that the ship went down, and of course she has little hope that he was saved. Mr. Woody was an excellent young man.

Ten Thousand People Treated In State For Hookworm Disease In Three Months.

During the first three months of 1912, in spite of the terribly cold weather, ten thousand sufferers in the State from hookworm disease have been treated. Ten thousand North Carolinians have already during the present year been improved in health, made more comfortable, happier and better fitted to become producers. All of them received free treatment in the county dispensaries. They represent men, women, and especially children of the following counties: Johnston, Craven, Cartaret, New Hanover, Beaufort, Bertie, Edgecombe, Chowan, Gates and Martin.

The County Dispensaries for Free Examination and treatment of hookworm disease are in progress in the counties of Wake, Greene, Edgecomb and Martin.

The counties have been so enthusiastic about the hookworm Commission, Raleigh, N. C., usually has a number of counties on the waiting list. Among those which have already made the provision to have the dispensaries are Duplin, Vance, Person, Nash, Wilkes, Richmond.

Dr. George F. Leonard will enter the hookworm campaign in North Carolina May 1. He is a graduate of the State University, medical graduate of George Washington University, and has been in the service of the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service for five years.
