DEATH'S GRIM REAPER

Washington, May 11. — "A greater number of Americans perish from eating diseased meat than from any other cause."

Mrs. C. B. Crane made this statement to the House committee on expenditures in the Agricultural Department today, while advocating the adoption of the Nelson resolution to investigate the meat inspection service.

Mrs. Crane, replying to a recent circular of the department of Agriculture which described her as being "in the pay of some one, said that an expert in hygiene and sanitation she had been employed by an Ohio manufacturing concern at the personal solicitation of its owner, but that employment, she said, was entirely foreign to her present mission.
