Masie when the Allen clan shot up Carroll county court, was made on the witness stand here today by Judge D. W. Bolen. Hendersonville, May 22—Remarkable progress was made in the Myrtle Hawkins murder trial, six witnesses having been produced when court adjourned this afternoon. Those testifying were Coroner Kirk and members of the Hawkins family. Evidence introduced tended to establish beyond a doubt the identity of the body found in Lake Oseola September 10 and to make certain that the girl died from the effects of a criminal operation. Coroner Kirk testified that death was the result of a operation or shock while counsel for the defense endeavored to bring out the fact that drowning could have been possible, judging from the condition of the body. Dr. Kirk identified the body as that of Myrtle Hawkins, the deceased, said that he could be mistaken in the identification. The clothes on the body were introduced in court and identified by various members of the family as those of the missing girl.

No evidence was brought out tending to incriminate any of the defendants. Since the identification has been made by various persons, much interest is attached to the evidence to be given by O. Shelmut, who it is claimed will testify that Myrtle Hawkins is still living.

Hendersonville, May 24—Testimonies testified in the Myrtle Hawkins case today, the evidence tending to show that the alleged strange noise actions around the home of Calls and Bradleys prior to the finding of the body of the girl in Lake Oseola and the fact whereabouts and remains of the girl.

Robert Waddell, who was employed by Dan McCall last September and in whose house the body was found on Thursday night, September 7, when he returned home at 1 o'clock, there were two lights in the house and that on Saturday morning there was an offensive odor at the barn; that on Saturday night about 12 o'clock he returned from his room a number of persons crossing the creek, in the rear of the house, moving towards the lake, and that about half an hour he heard a loud noise in the house and a rushing of water.

On Tuesday, he said, he visited the barn loft and found the body laid edge to edge, which he rolled up bearing most offensive odor, similar to that observed on Saturday and similar to that from the body taken from the lake.

He also saw evidences of something like a body lying in high weeds near there he smelled the same. A wide plank, he said, was missing from the barn loft the witness contradicted in several times upon cross-examination and admitted that he was an illiterate.

Waddell further testified that Saturday morning Mrs. Beulah McCall stated in the presence of several persons that Myrtle Hawkins had given her a ring, some other jewelry and a watch, and that she had given her a clock, but had not given it to her. The little clock in the spillway Saturday afternoon by Lucy Wright, the body, was found on Sunday morning, was exhibited and testified as being similar to the one belonging to the Hawkins, which had not been seen since she left home.

Miss Dryman and Katie White of Asheville testified that the same Thursday they saw Mrs. Shafte purchase two tickets for Hendersonville, one with the name of the witness and the name of the witness accompanied her.

A. McIntyre and V. A. McCall testified in separate conversations, McIntyre told them that Myrtle died from an operation, and that an overdose of chloroform was administered by Arthur Miller, whose daughter married Mrs. Shaft's son. McIntyre was subpoenaed as a witness. Mrs. Britt, testified that McIntyre told him that Myrtle had to take \$150 worth of jewelry from her father's store to give to her if she would marry him, as he said she expressed. It was brought out, however, that most of the witnesses had some differences of opinion. Shafte and may have been friendly toward her.
