Chicago, 21.—Williams J. Bryan when informed of Judge Parker's acceptance said he had nothing to add to his former statement to day when he telegraphed to a number of prominent Democrats throughout the country.

The telegram was addressed to Speaker Clark Governor Wilson of New Jersey, Governor Burke of South Dakota Governor Fress of Massachusetts, Governor Baldwin of Connecticut and Mayor Gaynor
