HELLEN GOLD OBJECT TO OLDMAID SIRMON

Grand Junction, Col., July 25. — When the Rev. Elmer V. Huffner, just resigned as pastor of the first Christian church, delivered a sermon recently advocating the exile of old maids to a barren island as waste humanity, he anticipated local resentment, possibly but hardly expected to find himself at issue with Miss Helen Gould of New York, in her letter Miss Gould takes issue with the opinions voiced by Rev. Huffner. Miss Gould's letter follows:
"Glancing over a Denver paper, I notice an item concerning your sermon on 'Love, Courtship and Marriage.' One part of which I especially notice saying that old bachelor maids should be isolated on an island so they could not hinder the progress of civilization. MISS SNOODGRASS' BODY FOUND IN SMALL CREEK

Catskill N. Y., July 29. — The body of the young woman found yesterday in Dubois creek near this village, was identified this afternoon as that of Miss Dorcas I. Snodgrass, a nurse, who has been missing from the home of her sister in Mount Vernon since early in July. The identification was made by Frederick Schmidt, the young woman's fiancé an electrical contractor of Mount Vernon.

The body was so badly decomposed that identification except from the jewelry and clothing, was difficult. Mr. Schmidt and Lieutenant Siverton immediately identified a diamond ring and portions of clothing taken from the remains as the property of Miss Snodgrass. Schmidt recognized the ring as one he had given her upon their engagement. Mr. Schmidt said:
"I'm satisfied it is the body of Miss Snodgrass."
Lieutenant Siverton was equally emphatic.

There are many theories advanced as to the events immediately preceding Miss Snodgrass' death and as to the cause of death itself. Corner Van Veenburg has certified that "from the circumstances surrounding the cause of death was drowning."
Local officials, however, are inclined to believe Miss Snodgrass was the victim of foul play. Lieutenant Siverton expressed the opinion that Miss Snodgrass died as the result of an accident.

Sheriff Post of Greene county, in charge of the police investigation, tonight said:
"In my opinion Miss Snodgrass' dead body was brought up Dubois creek in a launch or boat and deposited at or near the place where it was found. I do not see how it would be possible for a body to have been carried by the tide as far up the stream."

"This, to my mind, negatives the theory that Miss Snodgrass fell or jumped off a boat in the Hudson river."
Practically the same view was expressed by Loren Hubbard, chief of police.

Many small boats enter the bay in the river where the creek empties into the Hudson. This fact gave rise to the theory advanced by some that Miss Snodgrass' body had been conveyed to the place where it was found by one of these canal victors.
