Roosevelt Assaulted

Our heart is bowed in the deepest sorrow, — news has just reached us of the criminal assault made upon Theodore Roosevelt in Milwaukee Monday, by a hardy assassin. When Roosevelt was nominated for Vice-President the Bosses thought they had him buried. When he left the Presidency they thought they were through with him. When they defeated his Candidate for Governor of New York they boasted that his power had vanished. When they deprived him of the nomination at Chicago they again sent forth the vaunt that he was down and out. No doubt some of them will inwardly rejoice that the assassin's bullet is lodged in his honest breast, but this tragedy will only serve the more securely to enshrine him in the hearts and affections of the American people. It demonstrates to them that anarchy as well as Bossism, regards him as its most dangerous foe. It is but the natural culmination of the undeserved abuse that has been heaped upon him and we interpret it as a stroke of Providence designed to demonstrate to the American people that a man of Roosevelt's iron will and unconquerable courage is needed in this hour of the nation's peril; and we verily believe that if his life is spared a greatful people will show their appreciation of their greatest and mightiest fellow-countryman on the 5th of November, by again giving him the largest popular majority ever recorded in the annals of the Nation.

COLONEL ROOSEVELT SHOT AT MILWAUKEE

Milwaukee, Oct. 15, 1:30 a. m. —Roosevelt's wound now reported more serious than at first thought.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 14. —Col. Roosevelt left the hospital at 11:25 p. m. He was able to walk unassisted.

"I am feeling fine," he said. He will leave for Chicago before midnight.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 14. —Just as the Roosevelt special was leaving a sudden change in plans was made and the engineer was ordered to hold the train. It was said Colonel Roosevelt probably would remain here awaiting the arrival of Dr. John B. Murphy, a Chicago surgeon.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 14. —Colonel Roosevelt was shot at by a man some believe to be a socialist tonight, just as he was leaving the Hotel Kilpatrick for the Auditorium. His injuries are said to be trifling.

It is said the Colonel put his right hand underneath his coat and over his left breast but apparently was unhurt. The man who is said to have fired the shot was whiskered away in an automobile patrol wagon and landed in the Central station.

Henry F. Cochems, chairman of the speakers bureau of the Progressive party, captured the would-be assassin and it required the services of four policemen to keep him from being dealt with summarily.

The Colonel asked to have the man brought to him and when the would-be assassin was asked why he fired the shot no reply was offered. Colonel Roosevelt stood up in his carriage, waved the crowd away and started for the Auditorium.

The man who did the shooting refused to give his name. He had on his person a copy of the Colonel's itinerary, written on a sheet of note paper taken from the Bismarck Hotel and cafe, Nashville, Tenn.

The would-be assassin is 5 feet 5 inches in height, weighs 170 pounds, light complexion, bald, fairly well dressed. He confessed to the police that he fired the shot and made the remark:

"Any man looking for a third term ought to be shot."

Fully 500 persons followed the patrol wagon, eager to get at the man who did the shooting. The weapon used is said to have been a .32-caliber revolver.

A written proclamation found in the clothing of the man who did the shooting read:

"September 15, 1912, 1:30 a. m. in a dream I saw President McKinley sit up in a monk's attire in whom I recognized Theodore Roosevelt. The President said: 'This is my murderer, avenge my death.'"

"September 12, 1912, 1:30 a. m. while writing a poem, some one tapped me on the shoulder and said: 'Let not a murder take the presidential chair. Avenge my death.'"

"I could plainly see Mr. McKinley's features."

"Before the Almighty God, I swear."

Another note found in the man's pocket read:

"So long as Japan could rise to the greatest power of the world despite her surviving a tradition more than 2,000 years old as General Nogi so nobly demonstrated it is the duty of the United States of America to uphold the third-term tradition. Let every third term be regarded as a traitor to the American cause. Let it be the right and duty of every citizen to forcibly remove a third term. Never let a third-term party emblem appear on the official ballot."

"I am willing to die for my country. God has called me to be his instrument so help me God. (Signed) 'Innocent Guilty.'"
