### EX-PRESIDENTS OF UNITED STATES TO GET \$25,000 ANNUAL PENSIONS FROM CARNEGIE FUND.

New York, Nov. 21.—Future ex-President of the United States are to be pensioned in the sum of \$25,000 each annually by action of the Carnegie corporation of New York today.

The grant is provided for with the idea of enabling former executives of the nation to devote their unique knowledge gained in public affairs to the public good, free from pecuniary care. A similar amount is to be paid widows of ex-President as long as they remain unmarried.

The pensions are to be promptly offered to the ex-President or their widows so that no application will be required from them. Payment is to be continued so long as the recipients "are unprovided for by the governments."

The announcement followed the second annual meeting of the corporation, held at the residence of Andrew Carnegie here, and attempted by the corporation's eight trustees. Five of these eight trustees are the heads of the five institutions which Mr. Carnegie has founded—the Carnegie endowment for international peace, Elihu Root, president; the Carnegie foundation for the advancement of teaching, Henry S. Pritchett, president; the Carnegie institution of Washington, Robert S. Woodward, president; Carnegie hero fund commission, Pittsburgh, Charles L. Taylor, president; Carnegie institution of Pittsburgh, Wm. M. Frew, president.

The successors of these five men become ex-officio trustees of the Carnegie corporation of New York. In addition there are three life trustees—Andrew Carnegie, Robert A. Franks and James Bertram. The trustees authorized this statement of the corporation's aims:

"A total of \$125,000,000 in securities has thus far been transferred to the corporation, which will carry on the various works in which Mr. Carnegie had been engaged and such others as he may from time to time think it advisable to establish. Mr. Carnegie believes he has taken the surest means of securing for the future a body of the best possible trustees. The heads of the institutions named must inevitably be men of high moral and intellectual standing. They are empowered by a two-thirds vote to modify or discontinue any branch of the service which in their judgment has become inadvisable or unnecessary, or if better use can be made of the funds, and also to adopt from time to time such work as by them may be deemed most desirable for the wants of the age, so the from age to age the funds may be expended upon the most profitable work, whether that be the promotion of new ideas or the development of those of the day."

In the meeting the trustees took under consideration a number of matters, directly in their keeping and concerning the details of which no announcement was made, but the principal item of business passed upon was the pension plan for ex-Presidents of the United States and their widows. The official announcement covering the matter follows:

"Provision has been made through this corporation for a pension for each future ex-President and his widow unmarried, of \$25,000 per year as long as these remain unprovided for by the ration that they may be able to spend the latter part of their lives devoting their unique knowledge gained of the public affairs to the public good free from pecuniary cares. These pensions will be promptly offered to the ex-President or their widows, so that no application will be required from them."

No authorized reference was made to the matter of pension other than is contained in the foregoing announcement. Robert A. Franks of the three life trustees of the Carnegie corporation of New York, is treasurer of Carnegie foundation for the advancement of teaching. Mr. Bertram is Mr. Carnegie's secretary.

### Speed Limit Of Automobiles.

Be it ordained by the board of Aldermen of the City of Burlington that Section 58, of Chapter 3, of the ordinances of the City of Burlington, regulating the

speed of automobiles and other electric and steam vehicles, be repealed, and the following ordinance inserted in lieu thereof:

"That the rate of speed of automobiles, motor cars and steam vehicles of any and all kinds, shall not be greater than eight (8) miles an hour, within the fire limits of the City of Burlington, and not greater than twelve (12) miles an hour in any and all portions of said city; and upon approaching an intersecting highway, street, a bridge, dam, sharp curve or descent, a person operating an electric or steam vehicle of any kind shall have it under control and operate such a speed not to exceed five (5) miles an hour, having regard to the traffic then on such highway and the safety of the public.

Any person violating this ordinance shall upon conviction before the Mayor, pay a fine of Twenty-Five (25) for each offence; providing the Mayor, in his discretion may remit a part of said fine.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption.

### Pig Taught By Dogs To Be Rabbit Hunter

Delmar, Del., Nov. 20.—J. H. Langford, of Lewes, Md., a small village near here, has what he claims to be the original and only hunting pig in existence.

Sir Gunter, who is a thoroughbred Chester white, first made his appearance at the Langford homestead last August and was allowed to run around the house with a pair of small rabbit dogs. At an early age he showed signs of being a hunter and would follow the dogs to the woods and remain until they returned. When the season was open for rabbit hunting, Langford tried to induce "piggie" to stay at home, but he persisted in following and he allowed him to go with the dogs.

Several rabbits were chased and the pig was constantly following the dogs, but when he found they were running ahead of him he would cut across. When the gun was fired the pig was first to grunt his satisfaction. Langford will not sell the pig, but states he thinks after careful training he will be able to hunt him without the dogs.

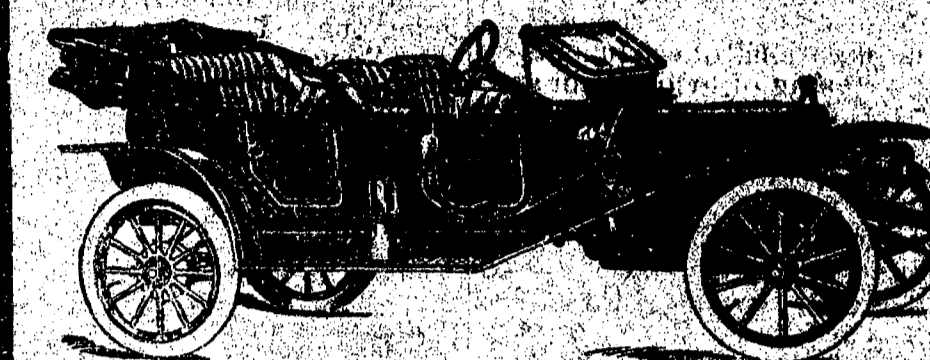

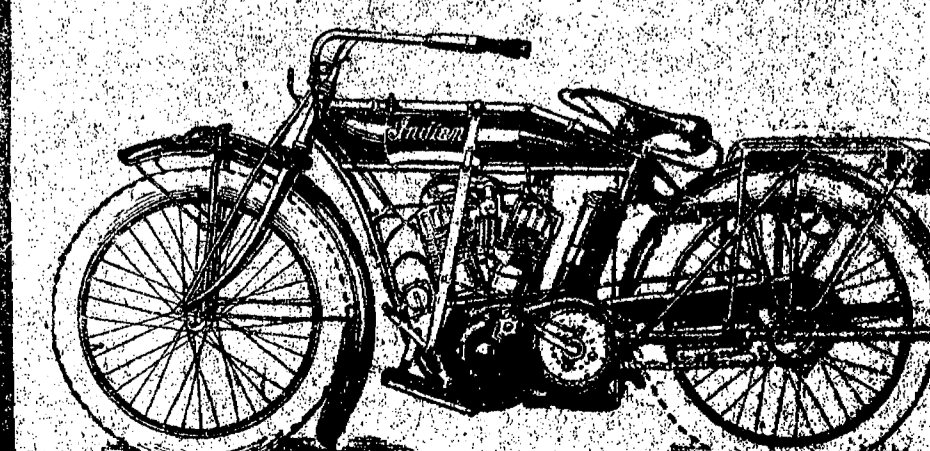
