There are about 4,400 Confederates buried in Gakwood Cemetery at Chicago, about 2,400 at Finns Point and a smaller number at each of the other places named.

The graves marked with individual headstones number nearly 10, 000, a large majority of them being in cemeteries in Elmira N.Y. Columbus O; Rock Island. Ills; Jefferson Barracks Mo; Springfield, Ills, and Madison Wis.
