Can Fall From Grace

Spencer, March 27.—The principal event of the week in Spencer is the series of open debates running for eight successive nights at the Baptist Church. The debaters are Rev. J. B. Briney D. D. of Louisville, Ky. and Rev. J. L. Viperman of Spencer the former representing the Christian Church and the latter the Baptist.
The opening was an auspicious one, the large church being filled with people. The first subject to be debated was: Resolved, That a truly regenerate man can so apostatize as to fall from grace and be finally lost. The affirmative was discussed by Rev. Briney and the negative by Rev. Mr. Viperman. It be said that the joint discussion have already created much interest in this section. Mr. Briney showed last night that he is a very able minister, a good representative of a denomination which is very strong in Kentucky and other Middle States. He is 77 years and is a forceable speaker. He came by special invitation to debate the subjects. Rev. Mr. Viperman is well known and highly regarded as a debater and fluent speaker. The best of feelings prevailed in the discussion.

IS MARIETTA FLOODED? FATE STILL IN DOUBT

Pittsburg, March 29.—Anxiety is felt here concerning the possible fate of Marietta, Ohio, at the mouth of the Muskingum river. The last news came yesterday morning from a point overlooking the town, and at that time the Muskingum and Ohio rivers had risen higher than ever before known there. All wire communication has been broken and the railroads cannot reach Marietta. The boat, Dewey, bound from Pittsburg to Zanesville with relief for that city, is expected to reach Marietta tonight and as it is equipped with wireless operators here are listening anxiety for news from the boat. Perusburg, W. Va., 12 miles down the Ohio river from Marietta, is also isolated, no news having been received from here since last night.

Shot Wife Through Head

A dispatch from Reidsville Monday night says: Walter Shelton well-known young man of this place shot and killed his wife here tonight at 7 o'clock. Shelton went to the home of Mr. Blacks in the southern part of the city where his wife had gone to call on the Blacks. Entering the room, Shelton drew his revolver and fired twice, one bullet penetrating the heart. Death was almost instant.

Just what the motive is not known. Shelton and his wife had been separated for a number of months. Mrs. Shelton before her marriage was Miss Lucy Trent. Shelton made his escape.

Greensboro Wants New Warehouse.

Greensboro, March 27.—It has been formally determined by the Greensboro Merchants of commerce in joint session that Greensboro shall have another leaf tobacco warehouse. At a joint session of the directors of the two organizations last night practically the entire \$18,000 necessary to erect a new warehouse was subscribed in stock. A lot has already been purchased and it is expected that the work will begin within the next thirty days. This will give Greensboro three warehouses, but the commercial people of the town that still greater opportunities await Greensboro and that still more warehouses are needed are planning a fourth place where leaf tobacco.

10,000 People May Go To Funeral Of Allens.

Mt. Airy, March 29.—The remains of Floyd and Claude Allen arrived here at noon today, accompanied by Victor Allen. About 500 people were at the station, including many neighbors and relatives. Among them was Claude's brother, Jasper.
On the arrival of the train the remains were placed in a covered wagon and the procession began a ten-mile journey to Floyd Allen's home. The funeral will be held at 12 o'clock Sunday at the residence, and the interment will be made in the old Allen burying ground nearby. It is estimated that from 10,000 to 12,000 people will attend if the weather is pretty.

There was no unusual demonstration, although a number of personal friends met the funeral party.

Mississippi Flood.

Memphis, Tenn., March 28.—Late tonight the Mississippi River at Memphis was within one foot of flood stage which, according to the forecast of S. C. Emery, local Weather Bureau forecaster will be passed tomorrow. At 7 o'clock the height at Memphis was officially reported at 33.7 feet, a rise of .5 in five hours at Cairo 48.1 a rise of .7 and at Vicksburg 38 feet, a rise of .2. Mr. Emery in a bulletin issued today predicted that the stage here would exceed 43 feet, how much he could not estimate and that a stage of 10 feet would exceed 43 feet, how much he could not estimate and that a stage of 40 feet would be reached within five days.

The first refugees were brought to Memphis tonight from the Arkansas lowlands opposite this city. A number have been assembled at Marianna, Ark., and the Governor of that state was urged today to ship 50 tents to that town with a view of establishing a refuge camp.

A dispatch from Bulah, Miss., tonight reported the water up to the base of the rock levee being constructed to replace the Dyke swept away by the floods last year.

Surgeons Must Make Study Of Vaccine.

Washington, March 27.—Before the public health service can determine the efficacy of Dr. Friedman's tuberculosis remedy, it must have his vaccine and know the method of its preparation and administration. This information is still withheld by the Berlin physician and the government surgeons are proceeding as rapidly as possible with a study of the cultures he has submitted. Before the examination is concluded, however, it will be necessary for the surgeons to study the vaccine and all its properties.

To expedite the government's investigation, Surgeon-General Blue today announced the appointment of Surgeon P. H. Lavinder, of the public health service, as a member of the commission of investigation.

The sixty patients now under treatment in New York are regarded by Dr. Blue as an insufficient number upon which reach quick conclusions. He believed 200 or more should be inoculated. Dr. Lavinder, with Mr. A. M. Stimson will observe the inoculated patients.

Right of Married Women Are Extended.

Senator V. S. Bryant secured the enactment of a most salutary law giving to married women the right to recover damages for personal injury and for personal earnings. The law goes into effect immediately, and provides that the earnings of a married woman by virtue of any contract for her personal service and any damages can be recovered by her suing alone and such earnings or recovery shall be her sole and separate property as fully as if she had remained unmarried.

Automatic Electric Blocks.

Washington, March 21.—President Finley, of the Southern Railway Company, announced today that work will be commenced at an early date on the installation of automatic electric block signals on the line between the Company's Alexandria terminals and O ange, Va., a distance of 78 miles. This system will connect with automatic block system of the Washington terminal Company, so that the entire line from Washington D. C. to Orange, Va., will be operated under automatic electric block signals.
