One day in Port Said an old Arab craved the privilege of telling the fortunes of Mr. Ragland's party. Among other things the old man said to Mr. Ragland was: "In a few years you will marry a woman whose husband is now living."

Two years later Ragland met Mrs. Ford. Her husband, William H. Ford, of Toledo, had died shortly before.

It is expected that Miss Jessie Wilson's wedding will take place November 15 or 22, it was unofficially announced today. The east room of the White House will be the scene of the nuptials, the ceremonies will be extremely simple. Miss Wilson has been engaged to Francis Bowes Sayre, of Lancaster, Pa., since last October, but the engagement has been kept secret at President Wilson's request. Sayre is at present an Attorney in the office of District Attorney Whitman, in New York.

While close friends of both of the families have known of the engagement for some time, an-
