We do not know that these parties are operating a common blind tiger and do not charge it to them, but we do know that somebody in Alamance County or nearby is dispensing a lot of this annoying fluid, as an evidence of our statement it was only necessary for you to have observed the forward and reverse action of many of the brethren who had lost control of their lower limbs and mental capacity last Friday while celebrating as they call it "The Glorious Fourth of July."

It is a sad picture indeed to behold any human being who has fallen so low as to spend his time and energy in trafficking with the drink for gain only that will do nothing more than destroy the present and mar the future life and happiness of human beings. Therefore, it devolves upon the true and sincere law abiding citizens of our town and county to demand of our officers the enforcement of law and uphold and assist them in this great and important undertaking, and any man that conceals any violation of any law knowingly and intentionally is an accessory after the fact and should be convicted and punished in the same proportion as the one who violated the law. We therefore repeat that law must be enforced or it should be repealed. We ask for a full enforcement and if the results are not satisfactory then a repeal.

### Husband Claims The Shooting An Accident.

Raleigh, July 4. —The condition of Mrs. Floyd Prince, who was shot through the abdomen at the hands of her husband, near McCullers, Thursday, was reported as having undergone no change at Rex hospital today, though she is critically ill. Those who know Mr. Prince take his word for it that the shooting was an accident and up to noon today the authorities had not taken any action. To add to the seriousness of Mrs. Prince's illness is the fact that she is in a delicate condition, her accouchment being only a question of a few weeks.

According to the husband, who with Dr. Judd, of Cardenas, brought his wife to the hospital Thursday afternoon, he was fooling with a pistol on the bed at noon Thursday, Mrs. Prince standing at the window. He had snapped the gun several times not thinking it loaded, when the pistol discharged, sending the bullet into his wife's abdomen. It was nearly 4 o'clock before a physician was secured.

Mr. Prince returned to his home Thursday night, saying that he would return today. The authorities are convinced that the shooting was accidental.

The nature of the wound, serious in any event, is doubly serious on account of the condition of Mrs. Prince. The pistol that was responsible for the injury was traded to Mr. Prince's brother for a debt, it is said, and Floyd Prince was examining it when the thing exploded. Nobody was at the home at the time, it is said. Mr. Prince is about 24 years old.

### Pittsburg Bank Goes To The Wall.

Pittsburg, July 7. —Pittsburg witnessed a series of financial difficulties Tuesday that began when the First-Second National Bank one of the largest banks in the county, failed to open for business. Within a short time the First National Bank of McKeesport closed and during the afternoon receivers were appointed for the American Waterworks & Guarantee Co., one of the largest concerns of its kind in the United States and for the banking house of J. S. and W. S. Kuhn, Inc. A run made on the Pittsburg Bank for Savings, another large institution.

Financial difficulties confronting the Kuhn interests of Pittsburg was the cause of the trouble. It is said embarrassment is only temporary and that there is no immediate cause for alarm. Heavy investments in waterworks propositions, coal and timber lands and interurban railway companies, together with the financing of an office building are given as some of the causes leading up to today's suspensions. An alleged deficiency of \$2,145,000 in the legal re-seize of the First-Second National Bank and the subsequent examination brought matters to a climax.

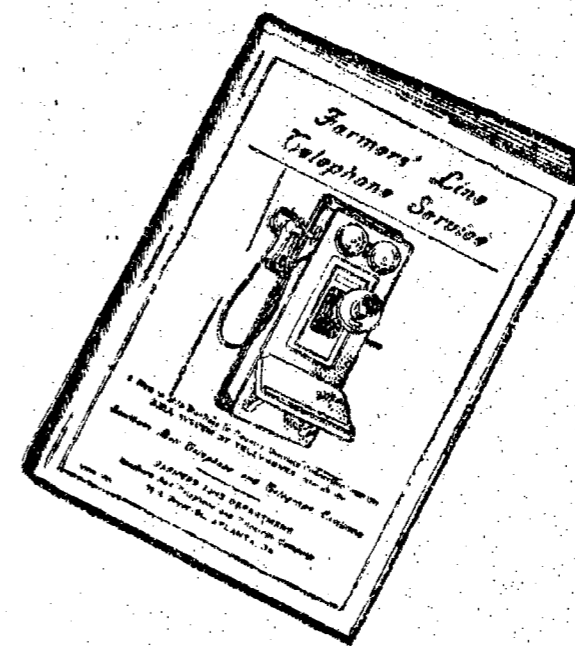
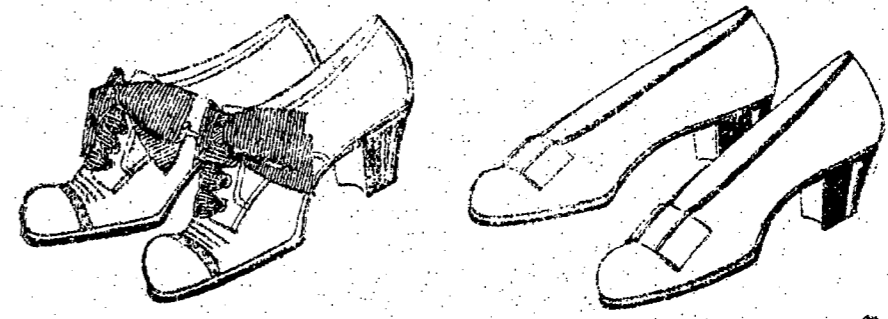
