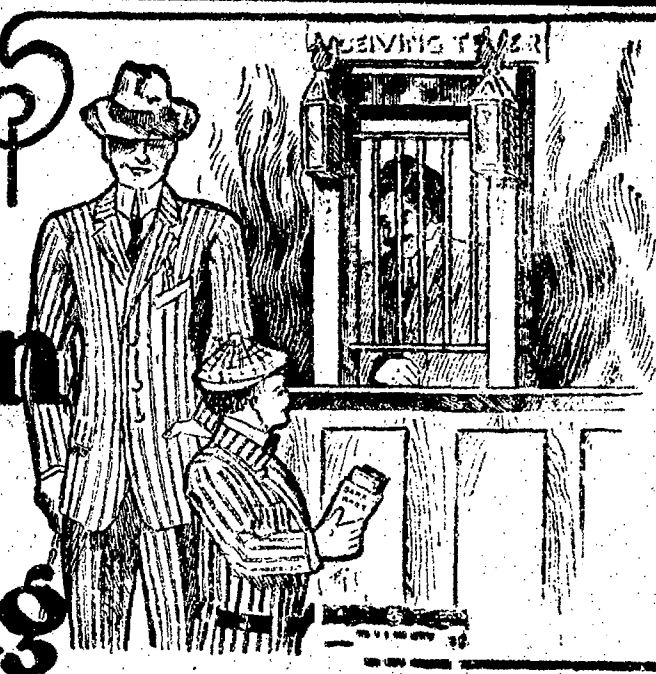
Mr. Carl Tillman has been right sick since Sunday.
