Shirt Waist Man Is Barred In Hotels.

New York, July 3.—The shirt-waist man will have to go hungry if he hopes to go coatless to eat in any of the big hotels of New York. Not one hotel will tolerate the cool but unconventional innovation in masculine dining attire which Philadelphia permits during hot weather.

"Let 'em eat in Philadelphia if they want to wear shirtwaists without coats," the management at the Hotel Knickerbocker declared yesterday. "New York will not tolerate attire that would be improper in any well regulated home."

"No shirt-waist man would be allowed to enter any dining room of the Hotel Plaza," with the thermometer at 210 and mounting higher," Manager King declared.

"I don't believe a Philadelphia man in this city would expect such a thing," said Manager Eisler at the Waldorf. "The Vanderbilt hotel would be opposed to such an innovation," said Manager Brown. "To begin with the New York man is too well groomed and has too good an idea of the conventions to wish to be cool at the expense of good taste."

CARL PUTNAM IS KILLED BY LEVER CAR ON C. & Y.

Lexington, July 3.—Col. H. B. Varner, president of the North Carolina Goods Roads association announced today that an invitation has been extended to President Wilson to attend the convention of that organization at Morehead City, beginning July 30, and deliver an address. It is expected that Hon. Jonathan P. Bourne, jr., former senator from Oregon, will be present and make an address on Federal aid in road building.

A telephone message received here this morning brings the news that a large part of the lumber plant of Peace and Hughes at Denton, was destroyed by fire at an early hour today. The boiler room and a large part of the machine room were completely destroyed and the loss is very heavy.

Carl Putnam, a white youth, 19 years old, was run over and killed by a lever car on the Carolina & Yadkin River railroad this morning at a point somewhere between Denton and High Rock. The young man was a member of the section force, in the employ of the railroad and was just beginning his labors of the day when the accident occurred. Details of the affair are not obtainable. He was a son of O. C. Putnam, of Denton.
