## Bulgaria Is Begging Rumania For Peace.

London, July 17.—Rumanian troops are at Pleвна and Mesedra, the latter town within 30 miles of Sofia, and King Ferdinand of Bulgaria is suppliant to the king of Rumania for terms of peace.

It is understood that the powers are striving to induce Rumania not to occupy Sofia and are urging Bulgaria to appoint a delegate to confer with the Servian and Greek premiers.

The real facts of the situation are only just becoming generally known in Sofia and are causing dismay among the people. M. Malinoff's efforts to form a cabinet appear to have failed. Fighting of no great importance continues on the Greek and Servian fronts.

The Sofia correspondent of the Times commenting on the desperate situation in Bulgaria, says:

"Despite 35 years of astonishing progress, surrounded by jealous enemies, her position always has been more critical than her statement have been willing to admit, and the fatal mistakes of believing that Russia would protect her against the consequence of misadventure now is manifest."

## Expert Will Study Malaria Problems.

Washington, N. C., July 16.—Congressman John H. Small, who has been here for the past few days, gave out information this morning which will be of vital importance to the residents of Eastern North Carolina. Mr. Small has arranged with the public bureau of health to send an expert here to study the malarial and mosquito problems in this district.

Dr. Carter who is recognized as one of the most noted experts in the United States on sanitation and public health, will visit Washington some time in August. Dr. Carter had charge of the sanitation in Panama.

While he is here he will cooperate with the county health superintendent and the city health officer. He will not only study malarial conditions and their causes, but will deliver at least one stereoptical lecture to the citizens, showing how mosquitoes propagate malarial position.

The only condition that Dr. Carter imposes on the different towns he will visit is that the cities through which their mayors and boards of aldermen request him to visit their respective towns.

Dr. Carter will only go to those places where his services are asked for.

## Miss Blossom Paid Fine.

Richmond, Va., July 16.—Blossom Browning paid a \$25 fine in court here today for wearing a slit skirt and declared she intended to go to New York at once "where people are not prudish." She was charged with indecent exposure. The skirt, slit knee high and held by the police as evidence was restored to Miss Browning on her promise to sew up the slit or not appear on the streets of Richmond wearing it.

Miss Browning's lawyer argued that the sale of the skirt by a license department store permitted her to wear it. The judge replied that the city licensed the sale of fire-arms but they did not authorize murder.

## Fogleman Out Of Jail.

Greensboro, July 16.—John E. Fogleman, the young white man who was convicted at the term of court of second-degree murder and was sentenced to 30-years imprisonment by Judge R. B. Peebles, was released this afternoon from the county jail. He was convicted of the murder of W. H. Tucker. His bond of \$5,000 in the murder case was made by D. E. Thomas and W. S. Shaffer and C. B. Wilkerson stood security for a bond of \$2,500 required for his appearance for trial on a number of retailing cases.
