EVERYBODY ABOUT THE VITAL

Everybody should know the A B C's about the new vital statistics law. Why? Because you and I will have to comply with it once when we die, and all North Carolinians born after October 1st this year will have to comply with it twice. It is at least worth something to know about a haw that touches us at both ends of life, but this law will do more. Indirectly 't will keep in touch with us all our life. It will be ten times more too much typhoid for a college.

The law itself contains more printed matter than two whole pages of this newspaper and is "curst hard reading" at that. For the reader's benefit we give the gist of how the law operates, what it requires and briefly the benefits we may expect leges would have paid any attention from it.
