SUBMARINE AND AUTO.

Both in Their Infancy Together and Both Have Rapidly Developed to a High Degree of Efficiency,

(From The Wall Street Journal.) Thirty-wo automobiles started from New York on a test run to Ardsley in 1901 and only one car finished, all the others broke down or expired on route. Today it would be surprising if one broke down and all did not finish with a perfect score. Such has been the tremendous development and perfection of the automobile in the last decade and a

The sill marine was in its infancy at the same time the automobile was in swanddling clothes. Both have developed with tremendous rapidity and models of a few years ago are now considered archaic.

One would view a 1907 automobile these days with a good deal of curiosity. Certainly not much in the way of power and performance would be expected of it. For the same reason a 1907 model submarine cannot be considered in any sense representative of the present day highly developed boat.

The submarine which sank in Houclould harber was laid down in 1907, If the layman will think of this in automobile terms, he will be less surprised at the regretable and deployable accident which occurred in Honclula harbor.

The designation of submarine types by letters indicates different years in which they were laid down. We are now building the P-type but the M- 4 type is the latest model tested out and in use.
