A PERPLEXING PUZZLE.

a situation in that commonwealth, brought about by recently coacted Prohibition laws, which constitutes a puzzle that neither the Attorney-General nor the Governor nor any other State official has so far been able to solve. A short time ago, it appears, a prominent citizen died leaving to his sisters an estate in which is included a quantity of fine wines, valued at approximately six hundred dollars and purchased before the traffic in intoxicants was outlawed in the county in which the testator resided. The legatees are desirous of disposing of the wines but in their efforts so to do find themselves up against the law no matter which way they turn. Under the statue now in force in Alabama they are prohibited from shipping the wine outside of the State or to any other county in the State. They can not lawfully sell the wine either at wholesale or at retail, nor can they give it away. On the other hand, they can not have in their possession more than five gallons of wine without vioicting the law and running the risk of having to serve a jail sentence. If the legatees, instead of being women. were thirsty Alabamians of the male sex, it is a safe wager that they would long ago have completely solved the problem to their individual and collective satisfaction.


