EVIL OMEN IN SHADOW LAWN TALES OF PAST.

Long Branch, N. J., Nov. 12.—Will the President's honeymoon be spent at "Shadow Lawn," the \$1,500,000 palace by the sea?

There is now more than a possibility that it will. The honeymoon will come in the Christmas holidays and no real Christmas can be enjoyed where there is no snow, as in Pass Christian.

Therefore, the wise ones say that "Shadow Lawn" will house the president and his bride after the wedding.

Is "Shadow Lawn" haunted?

Long Branch residents, who will be neighbors of the president and his bride, and with whom I have talked on the subject, point out that the house has never brought anything but bad luck to its owners. It has always been a hoodoo. Sudden death or financial disaster has invariably been the tragic end of its occupants. "Shadow Lawn" is certainly the abode of many sinister shadows, as the records of its tenants shows.

I have just spent five hours examining "Shadow Lawn," both inside and out. I have trod the \$45,000 worth of carpets and rugs in the main social hall and on the grand marble staircase; have been in the room where President Wilson will hold his cabinet meetings, have seen the prize pheasants, the 3,000 chick-

ens, and 12 cows, have explored the hothouses where peaches, grapes and lemons grow all winter; have been all over the kitchen garden and have seen the luxurious marble swimming pool. Everything a man could desire I found at "Shadow Lawn." As Mayor Bryant B. Newcomb remarked:

"A man might be blockaded for a year in Shadow Lawn, and not be starved out."

"Shadow Lawn" stands on a hill in the center of about 40 acres of rolling land which has been beautified by every art of the landscape gardener. The house is of a colonial design.

The future lady of the white house will be able to receive her guests like a queen, in grand social hall, which measures 70 by 85 feet, and from which leads the grand staircase which is 25 feet wide at the base.

There is a large mezzanine floor and on the next floor there is a promenade hall, surrounding an open court, lighted from above through an art glass dome. The promenade on the third floor is used as an art gallery, the chambers, dressing rooms and bathrooms opening off the hallway.

Ivory color predominates in the social hall, the fluted pillars, arches and balustrades being of that hue. The walls are hung with green tapestries, having Greek border effects, and the color scheme is carried out

in the portieres, rugs and hangings.

The drawing room is done in Nile green, silver and ivory, and has an Italian renaissance mantelpiece. The billiard room is finished in English Gothic style.

Off the central hall are drawing rooms, dining rooms, billiard and card rooms. The bedrooms are arranged around the second floor galleries. Very wide stairways of marble connect the two stories.

The mansion is white, with a red tiled roof which supports two pavilions, surrounded with fluted columns. Over the north portico is a spacious roof of garden. The interior is a blend of Italian renaissance and English gothic and classic renaissance styles. The drawing room is adorned with rich portieres and its woodwork is of decorated ivory enamel. The dining room is marked by ornate fluted columns, embellished doors and mantel, with dark mahogany woods for a background.

The bedroom suite to be used by the President and his bride is finished in old blue with a ceiling of cream white and ivory woodwork.

Normally it takes five gardeners, ten cooks, and 30 house servants to take care of "Shadow Lawn."

When the President wants to indulge in his favorite habit of "meditating" he will be able to retire to one of the cupolas. From which he will be able to gather food for thought from the sight of the British
