This is newspaper week throughout the country, a week set apart for calling the attention of the people to the incalculable value of a free press as one of the foundations of all American institutions.

MR. ROOSEVELT'S WORDS

"The recurrence of national newspaper week should awaken in the hearts and souls of all Americans a renewed determination to defend and maintain and perpetuate the priceless heritage of a free press.

"The maintenance of an unfettered press, informed by truth and guided by courage and conscience and wholehearted devotion to the public welfare, is a fundamental obligation of patriot-

"I trust as a result of the forthcoming observance that Americans everywhere will have a renewed sense of the incalculable blessing which a free press confers. It must be maintained against all assaults."

GOVERNOR BROUGHTON FOLLOWS UP

Urging North Carolinians to join in the observance, the chief executive called it "an effort of the greatest significance."

"It comes at a time when the freedom of the press and freedom of speech are more strictly limited and restricted throughout the earth than at any time in modern history," he said. "These rights . . . will be enhanced and fortified by an adequate observance of this important pe-

riod set apart as newspaper week.

"Not only do the newspapers of the land exemplify this guaranty of the freedom of the press, but likewise they have a tremendous part in maintaining and keeping alive those other heritages guaranteed by the constitution, including the freedom to worship God according to the individual choice. It is essential to democracy that we have a free press. Jefferson, the greatest of our apostles of democracy, put a

free press as essential to all other freedoms and to democracy itself. "An informed press is one of the great

bulwarks of the people. In any democracy the people on the street must be well informed if democracy is to work and endure; and the press and the radio constitue the only means of keeping our citizens up with what is going on. "The converse of this is of course true;

it has been demonstrated that the first step of dictators is always to clamp down on the freedom of the press and freedom of worship. At the present moment it is true that only on the American continent do the workers and the housewife and citzesn generally have the privilege of reading about the world and its events and about their neighbors without the obscuring touch of a censor's pencil."

We never know the value of our greatest blessings until we are deprived of them. Freedom of the press, freedom of religion, freedom of speech and freedom of assembly are the foundation stones of American greatness.
