Scotia Seminary.

We visited Concord last Saturday and Sunday, but had not the pleasure of visiting Scotia Seminary. We met Rev. Mr. Dorland and learned from him that there were about 140 young ladies then in school and that they were then occupying the new chapel and dining rooms, and in a few days would occupy the whole of the new building. It is gratifying to us to know that Charlotte is not only well represented in scholarship, but two of the teachers are from our county. This is the finest school building we know of in this section, and has in connection with it the finest church (completed) in Concord. Then they have as pastor one of the ablest young ministers in the State, William A. Alexander, graduate of Biddle University. Mr. Dorland and his good wife are doing a noble work for our people, and we are glad to see their labors appreciated by such liberal patronage. They have young ladies from all parts of the country. From Massachusetts to Texas and Arkansas. The young ladies here are taught, besides fancy work, music, &c., general house-keeping, cooking and everything necessary to make a good housewife as well as a good school teacher, and we wish those preparing for the former, equal success with those for the latter.

From Raleigh.

MR. EDITOR:—The election is over, the Republicans of this county lost only one man—the Sheriff. The board is hard at work striving to ascertain who of the Congressional racers is victorious, Dockery or Bennett. The official report up to yesterday morning brings them on a tie. It is the general sentiment that Dockery is the lucky man. His friends are very hopeful. Education is attracting considerable attention among the most intelligent class, and especially those interested in popular education. A notice has been issued calling the teachers of the State to assemble in the Senate Chamber at this place on the 23d inst., for the purpose of organizing a Teachers Association. Great preparations are being made to make this meeting grand and instructive. A large attendance expected. The graded schools and colleges are in operation. Saint Augustine with her fine corps of teachers is blooming. Shaw University never had brighter prospects than now. Two hundred students have already been enrolled and others entering daily. The medical

department attached to this school opened on the 2nd day of this month with sixteen students—of this number, only one lives in this State. This department is destined to do much good for the colored people. Northern friends are putting forth every effort to make this enterprise just what it ought to be. The instructor is competent to discharge the important duties devolving upon him, therefore young men aspiring to this profession would do well to attend this school.

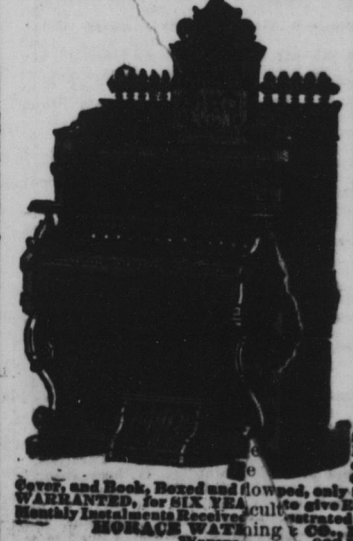
