**A Stray Arrow.**  
Thirty years ago, Mr Spurgeon was invited to preach in the vast Crystal Palace at Sydenham. Would his voice fill the area? Resolving to test it, he went in the morning to the palace, and thinking of a passage of Scripture to repeat, this, as he reached the stage, came into his mind: "It is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." Pronouncing the words he felt sure that he would be easily heard, and then repeated the verse in a softer tone. More than a quarter of a century later Mr Spurgeon's brother, who is also a pastor, was called to the bedside of a man, an artisan, who was near his end. "Are you ready?" asked the pastor. "O, yes," answered the dying man with assurance. "Can you tell me how you obtained the salvation of your soul?" "It is very simple," said the artisan, his face radiant with joy. "I am a plumber by trade. Some years ago I was working under the dome of the Crystal Palace, and thought myself entirely alone. I was without God and without hope. All at once I heard a voice coming from heaven which said, 'It is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners.' By the meaning of these words I was convinced of sin, Jesus Christ appeared to me as my Saviour. I accepted him in my heart as such at the same moment, and I have served him ever since." God honors his word. Suppose Mr Spurgeon had used a secular sentence to try his voice? What surprises await the faithful when results are known!

**A Woman's Accidental Discovery.**  
A rather laughable story is that ancient the origin of blue-inked paper, one such much in vogue for commercial use. The wife of an English paper manufacturer named William East, going into the factory on the domestic wash-day with an old-fashioned bluing bag in her hand accidentally let the bag and its contents fall into a vat full of pulp. She thought nothing of the incident and said nothing about it either to her husband or his workmen. Great was the astonishment of the latter when the paper turned out a peculiar blue color, while the master was wroth at what he regarded as gross carelessness on the part of some of his hands. His wife—wise woman—kept her own counsel. "The lot of paper was regarded as unusable, and was stored for four years. At length East consigned it to his London correspondent with instructions to sell it for what it would bring. The unlucky paper was accepted as a happily designed novelty, and was disposed of in open market at a considerable advance in price. Judge of Mr East's surprise when he received from his agent an order for a large invoice of the despised blue paper! Here was a pretty dilemma; he was totally ignorant of the manner in which the paper had become blue in color, and in his perplexity mentioned the matter to his wife. She promptly enlightened her lord; he in turn kept the simple process secret, and was for years the monopolist of the blue commercial paper manufacture.

**Quarrelling.**  
We find the following excellent sentiments going the rounds of the press. They are so good that every person, whether they follow the precepts they set down or not, must approve of them:  
One of the most easy, the most common, most perfectly foolish things in the world is to quarrel, no matter with whom, man, woman or child, or upon what pretense, provocation or occasion whatsoever. There is no kind of necessity in it, no matter of one kind, and no species or degree of benefit to be gained by it, and yet strange as the fact may be, theologians, quarrel, and politicians, lawyers, doctors, and the State quarels; nations and tribes and corporations, men, women and children, dogs and cats, birds and beasts, quarrel about all manner of things, and all manner of occasions. If there is anything in the world that will make a man feel bad, except pinching his finger in the crack of the door, it is unquestionably a quarrel. No man ever fails to think less of himself after than he did before one. It degrades him in his own eyes and in the eyes of others, and what is worse, blunts his sensibility to disgrace on the one hand and increases the power of passion on the other. 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
