GRAIN STOCKS COTTON PRODUCE CATTLE

WHEAT DECLINES WHEN WAR TALK COMES AROUND

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—In the absence of any development indicating that the war would involve other powers besides Turkey and Italy, the wheat market here showed a tendency to-day to decline. The opening was 1/4 lower to 1-3 up. December started at 98 1/2 to 99 1/2, the same change from last night as the market had shown together. A fall to 98 1/2 followed. Subsequent rumors of fighting between Greek and Turkish forces led to an upturn in wheat but the effect did not last. The close was weak with December 98 1/2 net lower at 98 1/8.

STRENGTH OF U. S. STEEL IS FEATURE OF MARKET TO-DAY

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Strength of the United States Steel shares was the feature of the stock market at the opening to-day. The common stock on an opening transaction of 8,000 shares rose to 99 1/2, a gain of 1/2. On moderate buying the gain was soon increased to a point. Steel preferred and American Smelting also gained a point and National Biscuit 3/4. Reading, Union Pacific and a majority of the other active issues opened a shade off. In the early trading the whole market advanced. Reading rose a point above yesterday's close.

NEW LOW RECORDS FOR COTTON IN NEW YORK TO-DAY

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The cotton market opened barely steady at a decline of 1/2 to 1 1/2 points this morning and all positions except October made new low records during the first few minutes, selling at a net decline of about 12 to 15 points under lower Liverpool cables, reports of easier spot markets in the Southwest and talk that the continued weakness of raw material was causing some renewed hesitation on the part of dry goods buyers. There was an active demand at the decline here, which carried December off to 10 1/2 or below the 10 1/2 cent mark, which had been the point of resistance for the past day or two, but prices rallied only three or four points from the lowest during the early trading and the South was again a heavy seller. The market closed steady with prices net 9 to 15 points lower.

WAR TALK FELT BY COTTON ON ADVICE FROM ABROAD

Cables were much lower than due owing to the hostilities between Italy and Turkey, which had more effect on the English market than they had on the American market yesterday. WAR NEWS MAKES LONDON STOCK MARKET SHAKY

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The unexpected outbreak of hostilities between Turkey and Italy caused the dealers on the stock exchange to-day to mark down the quotations early in anticipation of selling orders from various quarters. Turkish bonds were nominally three points lower, Italian bonds one point and British consols 1/4 lower, but sellers did not appear and good bidding resulted in the disappearance of most of the decline.
