NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 4 to 8 points under heavy general liquidation and Southern selling inspired by lower cables, reports of free spot offerings and a feeling that the cold wave had passed over without any widespread damage. October notices estimated at about sixty thousand bales were issued and that position sold up to 10.35 on the call. At the big discount under December, leading spot interests were heavy buyers of October, which soon became relatively weaker, while the general market continued very nervous and before the end of the first hour broke to a net loss of 7 to 9 points on the active months.

SERGEANTS GROW FAT ON DUTY IN PHILIPPINES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Uncle Sam's staff sergeants in the Philippines have waxed fat and the army subscribes to the dictum "nobody loves a fat man." So Inspector General Carlstrom, in his annual report to the Secretary of War, recommends that the fat be eliminated.

MEXICAN FEDERAL AND REBEL SOLDIERS DANCE TOGETHER

JUAREZ, Mexico, Sept. 27.—Federal and rebel soldiers dance together at Casas Grandes, which is held by the government forces, and there seems to be no effort of Federal in the district to check the rebel raids, according to Park Look, who arrived here today. He came to report to his father, George Look, that their ranch was raided yesterday and their Mexican ranch manager is held for ransom.

WIDESPREAD INQUIRY OF VICE IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—Resorts of various kinds, gambling houses and places where drugs are sold illegally came under the scrutiny of the county grand jury today in what is declared will be one of the most widespread investigations of vice in Chicago and suburbs ever undertaken.

MCGOVERN WILL VOTE FOR PROGRESSIVE ELECTORS

MADISON, Wis., Sept. 27.—Governor McGovern announced today that he would vote for Roosevelt and Johnson presidential electors on November 5. Aside from this the Governor said he would support the Republican congressional and State and legislative tickets.

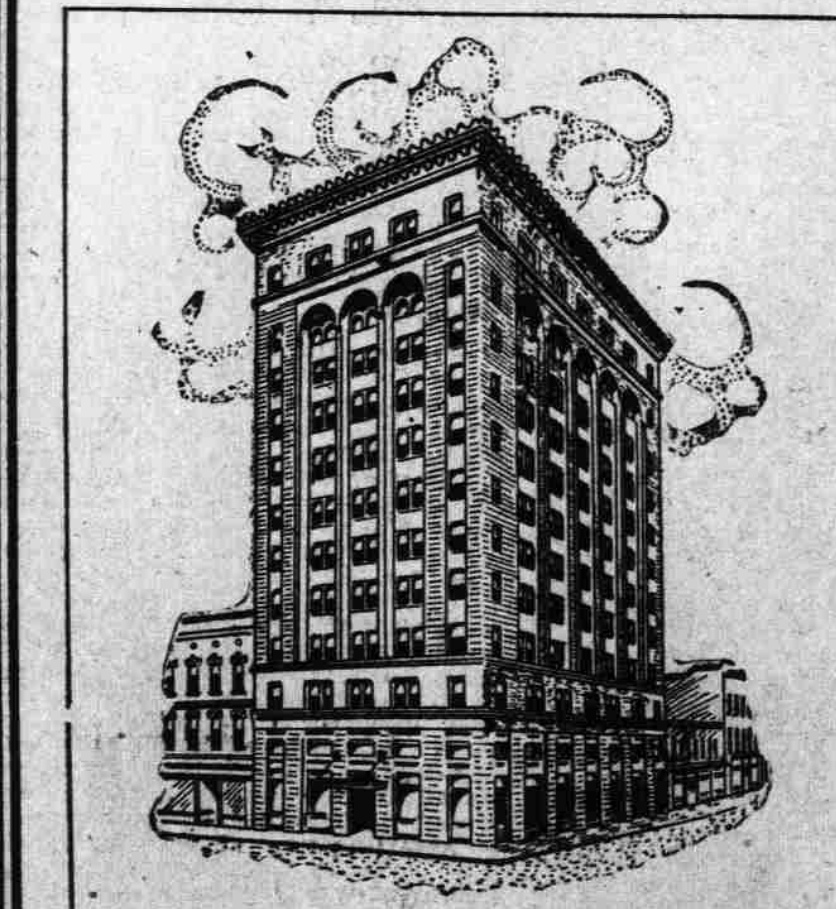
LAW MAY INVALIDATE AGED WOMAN'S SAVINGS

UNITED STATES PRESENTS CLAIM AGAINST PANAMA

Andres, secretary of the American legation. The amount of pecuniary compensation for the killing of David, an American citizen and the wounded of several marines and soldiers on that occasion has not been specified pending a further investigation.
