Ordinance FOR ELECTION ON ISSUING BONDS FOR IMPROVEMENT OF THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE AND FOR THE GENERAL GOOD OF THE CITY.

An Ordinance submitting to the voters of the City of Charlotte the question whether bonds to the amount of \$75,000 should be issued for improving the streets and for the general good of the city.

Whereas the Board of Aldermen of the City of Charlotte, did at its meeting held on the fourth (4th) day of March, 1890, pass through two readings an ordinance requiring the submission to the people of the City of Charlotte of the question whether the Board of Aldermen shall be authorized to issue coupon bonds to the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for the purpose of widening, paving, macadamizing, grading and otherwise improving the streets of the city, and for the general good of the city, and whereas the ordinance passed at that (3rd) reading at the present meeting of the Board.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Charlotte, N. C., do resolve and ordain: That an election be held in the City of Charlotte, N. C., on Monday, the 12th day of May, A. D. 1890, as provided by law and the charter of this

city; at which election the voters of said city shall be allowed to vote upon the question whether the Board of Aldermen or corporate authorities of said city shall be permitted to issue bonds to the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) and sell the same, the proceeds of sale to be applied to the purposes herein before set forth, and mentioned in the ordinance passed this day.

The said bonds shall be of the denomination of one thousand, or five hundred, or one hundred dollars, in the discretion of the Board of Aldermen, payable to bear at the expiration of thirty years, or such other time or times, not exceeding thirty years, as the said board may provide. They shall bear five (5) per cent interest, payable semi-annually, the instalments of interest to be represented by coupons attached to the bonds, the said coupons to be receivable in payment of city taxes.

The said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Clerk and Treasurer of the City, and sealed with the seal of the corporation. The coupons shall be signed by the city Clerk and Treasurer, and shall be in the form of orders on the Clerk and Treasurer, for the payment of the interest at the time specified therein on the bond to which they may be attached.

The said election will be held at the following places hereinafter named for each ward, and shall be conducted and superintended by four registrars and eight inspectors, one registrar and two inspectors for each ward of the city, to be appointed by the Board of Aldermen of this city, and the Board of Commissioners of the county of Mecklenburg—the appointee, in each case, to be resident of the ward for which he is appointed.

The Mayor shall give 30 days notice of the said election in some newspaper published in the city of Charlotte, N. C.

There shall be a new registration of voters for the said registrars at such places in each ward as the Board may appoint, where the books of registration shall be opened and kept open for that purpose.

The Mayor, in the notice to be published by him of said election shall designate the time and places of opening and closing the registration of voters, which shall not be less than 10 days before the election.

The polling places are appointed and fixed as follows:

- 1st Ward—J. Roessler's Store, Trade street. 2nd Ward—Mayor's Court Room. 3rd Ward—Thos. Garibaldi's, opposite Court House. 4th Ward—D. G. Maxwell's Office.

The following persons are appointed registrars: 1st Ward—M. W. Robison. 2nd Ward—C. F. Brown. 3rd Ward—G. J. Williams. 4th Ward—D. G. Maxwell. The following persons are appointed inspectors: 1st Ward—Jno. P. Long, M. Donnelly. 2nd Ward—E. L. B. Davidson, W. R. Hinton. 3rd Ward—Thos. Garibaldi, Lewis Perry. 4th Ward—J. H. Henderson, W. B. Taylor.

The Clerk and Treasurer of the city is required to furnish necessary registration books to the registrars, and all necessary tickets. Those who vote in favor of the proposition submitted to the people shall vote on a ticket "approved," and those who vote against said proposition shall vote on a ticket "not approved."

The result of said election shall be disclosed by said registrars and inspectors and recorded in the minutes of the Board.

Notice of Election. I do hereby give notice that, pursuant to the provision of the above ordinance, an election will be held in the city of Charlotte on Monday, 12th day of May, 1890, to ascertain the will of the voters of the city upon the question of issuing the bonds therein provided for.

Those favoring the issue of said bonds will at such election vote a ticket or which is written or printed the word "Approved," and to those opposed to the issue of the said bonds will vote a ticket on which is written or printed the words, "Not Approved." Books for the registration of voters will be opened on Wednesday, the 9th of April, 1890, and will be closed on Thursday, the 1st day of May, 1890, at sunset, at the following places, and by the registrars named: Ward 1—George Hall's, Sparky. Ward 2—Green & Co's office. Ward 3—H. C. Irwin's store. Ward 4—D. G. Maxwell's office.

The election will be held at the following polling places and under the inspectors named: Inspectors, Ward 1—John P. Long, M. Donnelly. Inspectors, Ward 2—E. L. B. Davidson, W. R. Hinton. Inspectors, Ward 3—Thomas Garibaldi, Lewis Perry. Inspectors, Ward 4—J. H. Henderson, W. B. Taylor.
