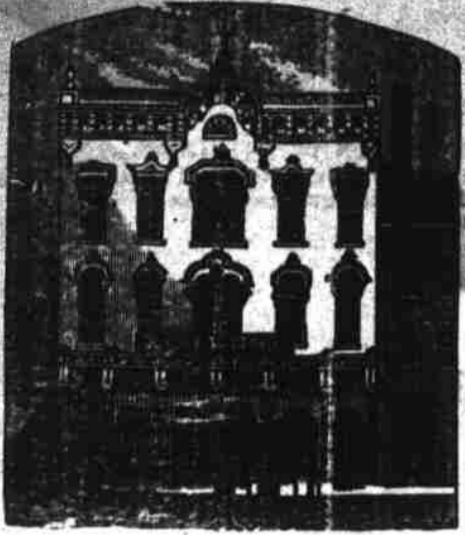

If we could not use our New York House, we should have to close our business.
