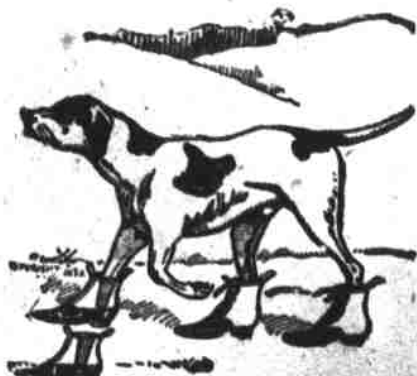

ST. PETERS HOME AND HOSPITAL. The St. Peter's Home and Hospital, located in the city, has received a large amount of comfort and relief upon the inmates of the hospital.

During 1891, 21 inmates have been recorded, for an aggregate of 3000 days. If to these we add the board of Matron, nurses, and servant, the Hospital has provided board and lodging for 255 days.

Total cash receipts \$107.87. Balance from 1890 90.75. Total cash \$198.62. Expenses in 1891 \$921.98.

Balance carried to 1892 \$14.61. The Board of Managers desires to call attention to the comparison of expense with the care and relief given to so many sufferers. It is a remarkable showing.

There have been more inmates this year than in any preceding one, except 1888; and the number of days board has exceeded even that year.

Several valuable boxes have been received from Woman's Auxiliary Societies; from Huntington, Long Island, Newport R. I.; Bath N. Y.; Washington N. C.; Paducah Ky. Besides many donations of useful things, given by friends in Charlotte for all which the managers return sincere thanks.

The hospital is again fortunate in closing the year without debt. There have been two deaths at the hospital during 1891. One was an aged man, who was taken from the Air Line train in a semi-conscious condition, and carried to the hospital by the depot policeman. He died six days afterward in the care of his son and son-in-law, who were summoned to his bedside.

The other was a young brakeman, injured in the Richmond & Danville yard, who lived only a few hours. The patients were divided as follows: From Charlotte, 12; Mecklenburg Co., 8; others parts of N. C., 29; R. & D. R. R., 2; Chester S. C., 1; Savannah Ga., 1; Petersburg Va.; Indiana 1; Tramps fed, 6. Total 62.

Belonging to the Episcopal church 11; Methodist, 15; Presbyterian, 8; Baptist 8; Lutheran 2; Roman Catholic 3; Associate Reformed Presbyterian, 1; No church given 74 Total 62.

The solicitor of the district thereupon moved for a suspension of judgment, which was so ordered by Judge R. W. Winston presiding, and Grimsley was discharged on payment of costs.

CHILL WILL ARRIVE. To-day's News from Washington is regarded to the situation. Special Telegrams to The News. WASHINGTON, 10 a. m., January 25.—The President's message on the Chilian affair is expected at the capitol at 1 p. m. today. The feeling here this morning is more warlike, especially in administration circles.

LONDON, Jan. 25.—The Times' correspondent at Santiago cables this morning that it is understood that Chilli has agreed to submit the entire difference to arbitration.

WASHINGTON, 12 m., Jan. 25.—The report received here this morning that Chilli is desirous of submitting the troubles to arbitration, may delay the sending to Congress of the president's message, which, it was expected, would be sent in at 1 o'clock today. The President has been in conference this morning with the leading navy officials.

HARRISON'S MESSAGE. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25, 2 p. m.—The President's message was sent to Congress at 1 o'clock. He reviews the evidence in the Chilian matter, and says that he feels compelled to stand upon the demands of his note of the 21st to Minister Egan, demanding reparation for the attack upon the Matia note, and an apology. The language must be disavowed as publicly as it was circulated, or the diplomatic relations must cease. Egan's recall will not be considered until these matters are disposed of. The President, in stating the reasons for making the demands advises Congress to confirm and enforce them.
