Many people in Washington have insisted from the time the announcement was made that extensive maneuvers of the army and navy would be held that the purpose underlying this demonstration was to demonstrate to the people of the country that more ships and more men are absolutely essential, if the United States is to be adequately defended. What else was shown, while important to the service, would be secondary, it is claimed, so far as the administration was concerned. There is at least a basis for this view of the action of the President in authorizing the maneuvers. It is known to be his intention to earnestly recommend an increase in the battle fleet and personnel of the navy, and Secretary Upinion Moody, will, of course, support the view of the Chief Executive in this
