Joseph Wheeler, the South's Great Military Chieftain is Laid to Rest in Arlington Amid Booming of Cannon and Sorrow of a Grateful Nation.

Last Rites Attended by President and Representatives of Congress. Veterans of Two Wars, Present and Mourn Loss of Dead Comrade and General.

Washington, Jan. 29,-With full military honors General Joseph Wheeler, the veteran of two wars, former representative in Congress and retired officer of the United States Army, was laid to rest in the National cemetery at Arlington this afternoon.

The spot selected for his final repose is on the grassy slope to the right of the historic Lee mansion, which overlooks the National Capitol. Veterans of the two conflicts in which Wheeler distinguished himself,
