It was ordered that a new school building be erected in District No. 2, Sharon township.

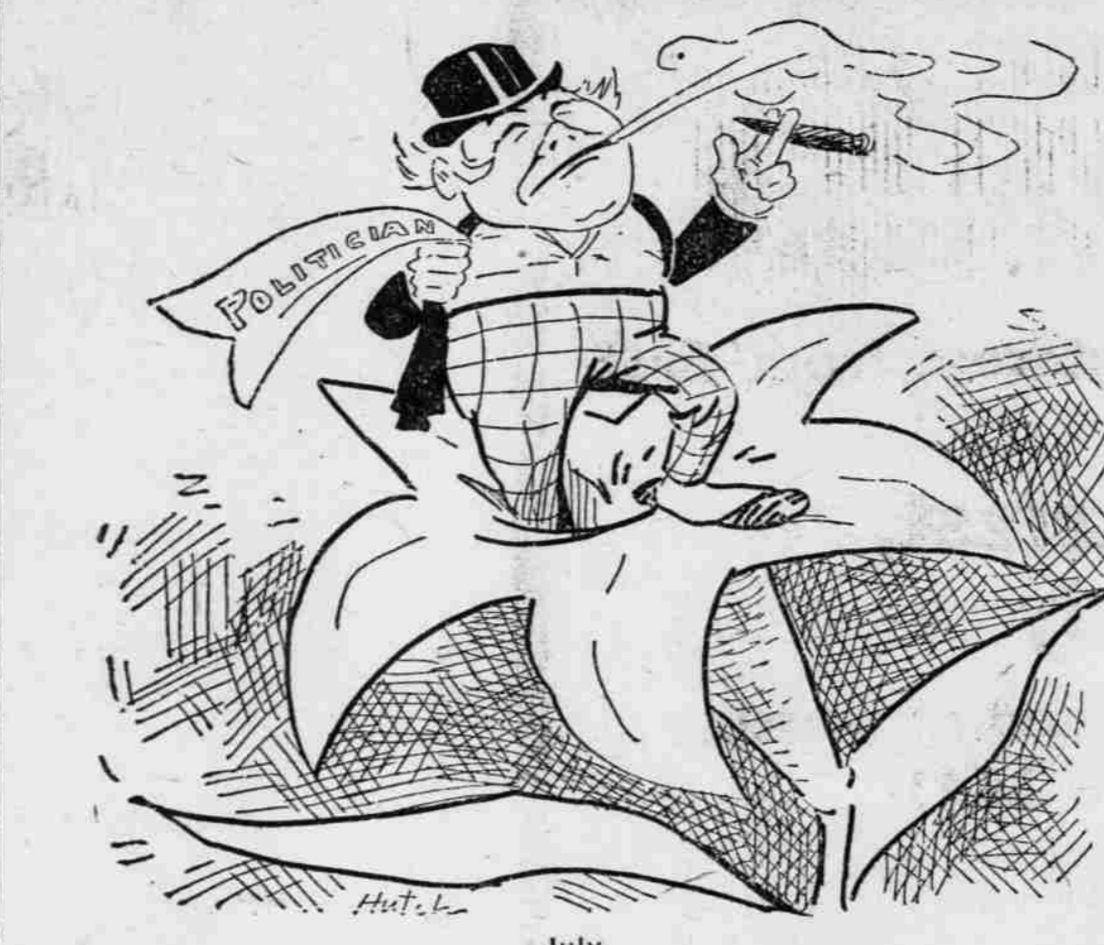
Messrs. H. G. L. Rea and John O. Alexander appeared before the board and asked for repairs and an addition to the present building.

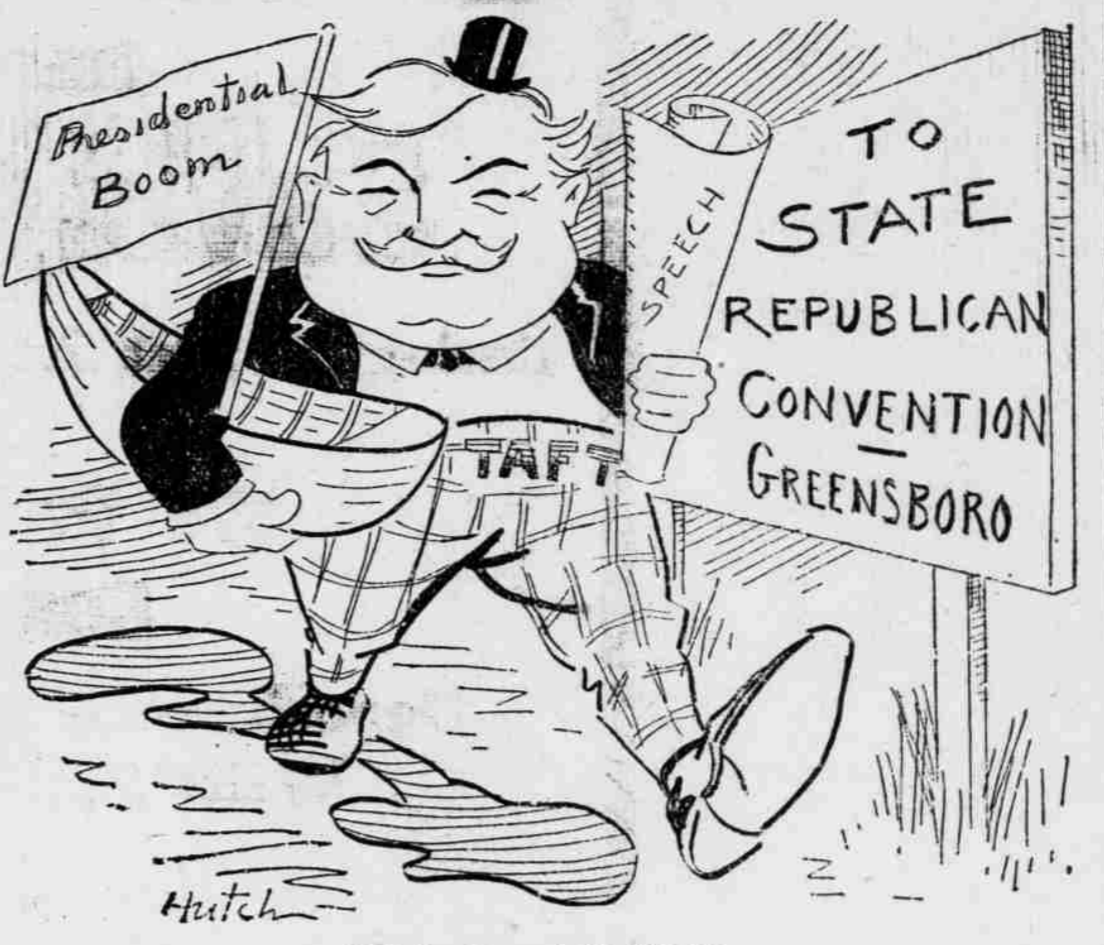
Early this Morning Wat Hill Shot and Killed Marion Burgess in Union County. Burgess and Wife were in Buggy. Cause Unknown.
