

Two or three days more and the green is gone, routed, vanquished. The yellow, now tipped nto golden brown dominates the field. Another day or so, and early

one morning a binder signs in the field. The grain is ripe and ready. It has been saved, and none is there to care for the biting, stinging, killing frost that comes a few nights later. The homesteader has made a gamble. He has gambled with Nature-and won. "And this is the annual gamble that human beings are making with Na-
