

Mystery Murder

Berlin, Jan. 6 .- The mystery surrounding the strange murder of Mme. Hoffmann, wealthy widow, sixty-eight years of age, is monopolizing public

attention at present. Mme. Hoffmann, who inherited a large fortune from her husband, was closely related to several high government officials, and occupled a prominent position in Berlin society. She lived alone in a small flat.

Curiously enough owing to the fear of being murdered, Mme. Hoff.mann refused to engage a companion or servant, declaring that an elderly helpless lady was easily killed by unscrupulous domestics.

Mme. Hoffmann, who out eveing, visited a theatre on the night of December 6, accompanied by a woman friend. The next morning the charwoman cleaned the flat as usual. This was the last time that Mme. Hoffmann was zeen alive.




