Mr. Humphrey, who has pressed vigorously for a subsidy for American ships, has been in close touch with Attorney General Wickersham during the preliminary investigation of the shipping pool. He urged the prosecution of the so-called Baltic pool, formed by foreign steamships trading at Atlantic ports, and was disappointed when informed this government was powerless to help it

the government has "Since brought suit," said Mr. Humphrey 'the foreign ship combine admits every charge made against it. The only answer is that the United States has no jurisdiction, and, therefore, it can continue to do as

"The conditions which exist as to passenger rates prevail also in the freight traffic. The rate on every pound of freight and on every passenger carried between here and Europe and between here and South America is fixed by agreements made in advance by this foreign mo-

"There is not the slightest competition between any of the foreign steamships running from this country upon either ocean. Not only are rates fixed by agreement, but all to forward shippers.

"Special rates are given by them to Standard Oil, to the steel trust an extent that competitors are absolutely excluded from competing with them in foreign countries.
