**New York Cotton**  
 New York, Jan. 10.—The cotton market opened firm at an advance of 1/4 points on the relative strength of Liverpool, the big English spot sales and the census showing 11,087,442 bales ginned to January 1, when the market had been sold yesterday on rumors that the report would show over 11,000,000 bales. Inside of the first half hour prices worked up to a net advance of from 15 to 20 points on active covering and bull support but commission houses turned sellers around 15.15 for May, presumably for the purpose of taking profits and as soon as long cotton began to come on the market there was a renewal of Wall Street bear pressure, under which prices eased off 3 or 4 points from the best during the middle of the morning.

**Liverpool Cotton**  
 Liverpool, Jan. 10.—Closing cotton: Spot large business, prices 2 points lower; American middling fair 5.11; good middling 5.17; middling 5.03; low middling 4.83; good ordinary 4.75; ordinary 4.72.

The sales of the day were 20,000 bales, of which 2,000 were for speculation and export and included 18,700 American. Receipts 24,000 bales, including 26,400 American.

**New Orleans Cotton**  
 New Orleans, Jan. 10.—Cotton futures opened steady at an advance of 4 to 6 points on good cables and the census report on ginning up to Jan. 1. This report was slightly below expectations. After the call the market was very steady on private cablegrams from Liverpool stating that the continent and Bombay were large buyers of American cotton in that market. The census report caused no great amount of trading. At the end of the first half hour of business the active months were 6 points up. Toward the middle of the morning the active months were slightly higher and prices were put to a net advance 7 to 8 points. Late in the morning the ring grew dull and under the inactivity and a desire for profits on the part of scalping longs prices sagged off. Commission houses had no orders and it was evident that the outside public was taking no interest in the market. Room traders furnished the bulk of the business. At noon the market was unchanged to 1 point up compared with last week's close.

**New York Stocks**  
 New York, Jan. 10.—(Wall Street)—The strength of Canadian Pacific on its increased dividend was a notable feature of the stock market at the opening. Fifteen hundred shares sold over yesterday's close. The stock soon made a further advance. Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste Marie gained a point. The tone of the general list was irregular with a sprinkling of gains and losses. Some heaviness was shown by U. S. Steel.

The market became reactionary and prices declined moderately with pressure directed especially against U. S. Steel, Reading, Union Pacific and Amalgamated Copper. This level uncovered buying orders in sufficient volume to check the decline and there was a general recovery under the leadership of Canadian Pacific, which advanced further to 257 7/8, an overnight gain of approximately 8 points. Business in general was depressed pending the publication of the monthly tonnage statistics of the United States Steel Corporation.

**Chicago Grain**  
 Chicago, Jan. 10.—An increase in the European visible supply served to lower the price of wheat here today.

The foreign crop summary was usually favorable. Sectional reports generally bullish, but in view of the disposition shown to take profit, many traders were of the opinion that a recession was in order. Argentine cable reported the wheat or three fine, the removal of wheat. The market opened 15 1/2 to 1 1/2 higher, then declined to 1 1/2-1 3/4 and rallied to 1 1/2-1 3/4.

Corn suddenly took a big start of activity, buying becoming general on the comparatively light country crop appearances over night. There were many resting orders to buy at 94 cents. May opened a shade off to 94 1/2 cents and shot up to 95 1/2-96 1/2.

Oats kept in narrow but despite corn strength, May started unchanged to a sixteenth lower at 34 7/8-35 1/8, sold at 34 3/4 and recovered to 34 7/8-35 1/8.

Provisions at the outset were based on account of a drop in hog prices but later advanced materially when corn. First sales were 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 lower than last night. May options going at 19 1/2 to 19 3/4 for pork and 10 1/2 to 10 3/4 for lard and 10 1/2 for ribs.
