Extension Chapter.

In the Association Monthly for October, under the head "Blazing along Educational Trails," by Helen L. Thomas, this question was asked: "Scores of girls in your city are out of school for the first time this fall—where are they? Who has a vital hold upon them?" It is a question that comes up in connection with association work every year in every town and it was answered in Charlotte, North Carolina, in the form of the Extension Chapter of the Young Women's Christian Association of Charlotte.

This extension chapter was organized in February, 1910, and was composed of about fifteen of the young society girls just out of school and college. These girls were gathered together by the general secretary at the home of one of the girls and the suggestion was made that we form ourselves into a study club to study our own city and its problems. The suggestion met with an enthusiastic response, and at a subsequent meeting the chapter was organized and a constitution and by-laws drawn up. The meetings are held regularly every two weeks at the homes of the members. There is a program committee which arranges a program for each meeting at the close of which a social hour follows over the tea-cups.

Our programs have three distinct parts. First we have one or two articles from the current magazines about sociological problems in the United States. For instance, the shirt-waist strike. The second part is some particular problem that must be met in our own city, and in this connection we have studied the problems presented by the moving picture, the vaudeville and cheap theatres. The third part is the study of the American girl wherever she is. We are taking up the study in this way—in industry; in factories and mills—the latest being especially interesting to us in this part of North Carolina; in business, in the professions, in colleges, in the army, in the country, and at home. In each case we are studying the girl and her needs, and how the association meets her needs. We are using the new hand book and many articles in the association Monthly.

One of the most interesting and helpful things we have done was the making of our "Know-Your-Own-City Map"—a big wall map of the entire city with every church, every school, every mill and factory, every moving picture, theatre and park marked on it. We are very much interested too in forming by degrees a library to be used in extension work.

In the summer we gave \$19.20 to the vacation camp fund. By the time the new building is completed we hope to be prepared, by the study we are doing now, to carry on the real extension work.
