

Saturday In The Legislature

The senate met at 11 o'clock, President Pro Tem Pharr, presiding and Rev. H. M. North, of Edenton Street Methodist church, offered prayer.

Several bills were received from the house, the most notable being one providing for the appointment of assessors against abutting property owners for paving, etc., in cities and towns and another making owners of dogs liable for damages in certain cases.

A report was received from the committee appointed by the general assembly of 1909 to investigate the Torrens land titles and 2,500 copies were ordered printed.

Bills Printed. Preventing the shipment of live quail out of the state. Authorize the town of Elkin to issue bonds.

Authorize Hickory to issue bonds to extend its sewerage system. Amend the road law of Montgomery county.

Concerning working the public roads of Lincoln county.

Reports from Committees. A substitute was reported for the bill relative to congress and the senate deferred action. Unfavorable reports were made on the bills relative to sub-tenants and allowing changes and alterations in streets and alleys when property is platted and sold in lots.

New Bills Introduced. Boydon, of Rowan: Appropriate \$25,000 for a suitable monument on the battlefield of Gettysburg to honor the memory of North Carolina troops.

Greene, of Craven: Promote public health by proper ditching and drainage.

McDowell, of Moore: Authorize Sanford to issue bonds to extend sewerage system.

Thorne, of Nash: Grant new charter to Whitaker's.

Haymore, of Surry: Establish additional school district in Stokes; also change township line in Surry; also establish graded school district to be known as Ararat in Surry.

Senator Cotton, of Pitt, asked that the bill preventing shipment of live quail out of the state be re-considered and was informed that it had already passed and been ratified, but that he could introduce a supplemental bill if he so desired. He thought the bill was rushed through without due consideration; that quail are now considered an asset for the farmer and that the bill does him an injustice. Senator Baggett declared that the bill is too drastic. No action was taken.

The committee reported favorably on the bill incorporating the Lenoir and Blowing Rock Turnpike Company, but Senator Brown moved that action be postponed indefinitely. Senator Long, of Iredell, urged the passage of the bill, which provides that the state furnish convicts to work the road at \$1.50 per day, receiving as payment stock in the company. Senator Long said the house had passed it after careful consideration. Senator Sigmon, of Burke, also spoke for the bill, declaring that it is a good proposition, the stock now selling at par, and that the road furnishes the only outlet that the people of that section have. After some debate the bill was made a special order for next Wednesday at 12 o'clock.
