DELANEY DOES CRITICISING, A LA SMITH

Clash! That is the word most fitted to express the surface conditions apparently existing now between Assistant City Attorney J. L. DeLaney and Recorder D. B. Smith.

Clash! Beginning Friday morning when Recorder Smith justified his decision of acquittal of the manager of the Park Driving Club by remarking that charges of so serious a nature should not be brought before him upon such evidence as was adduced by the prosecution, the differences of opinion appear to be more striking.

Clash! Mr. DeLaney learned what had been said by Recorder Smith and demanded that papers be served on Wilson, whom he alleges has practically admitted a violation of the ordinance which compels club managers to file a list of names of new members. The notice served the papers in the afternoon, the suggestion, or instruction, of Mr. Smith to the contrary, notwithstanding.

Clash! In the event of a conviction upon the charge, it is understood, the mayor will be asked to revoke the license of the club.

City Attorney Makes Statement.

To The Editor of The News: In your report of the proceedings in the recorder's court on the 27th, you had this to say in reference to the trial and acquittal of L. O. Wilson, charged with retailing:

"Retorting the allegation of L. B. Forrest, a non-resident, that he has purchased whiskey in the Park Driving Club from L. O. Wilson, the manager, testimony was offered in the recorder's court this morning that exonerated Mr. Wilson from the serious charge. Recorder Smith dwelling rather more than customary upon the character of the evidence adduced and, in the slightest kind of way, although kindly, criticising Assistant City Attorney DeLaney, who prosecuted the case."

From the reading of the above article the public would gather the impression that the evidence which DeLaney presented in the recorder's court, upon evidence which did not merit even the consideration of the court, appearing upon its face untrue. In view of this fact, I want to submit the evidence which I acted upon in this case.

L. B. Forrest on last Monday, while being tried for being drunk, testified that on Saturday night he went in company with B. H. Graham to the Park Driving Club and there got two drinks of whiskey for twenty-five cents and one pint for seventy-five cents from L. O. Wilson. B. H. Graham went on the stand and said yes, he went with Forrest to the Park Driving Club and they got the liquor, as Forrest said, but that Forrest did not pay for it—though, he admitted that Forrest laid the money on the table. Graham said the liquor was his, that he was a member of the club. I asked him when he joined the club? He was unable to answer. I asked him what his locker number was? He was unable to answer. I asked him what fees are charged him when he joined the club? He was unable to answer. I asked him where he had gotten the whiskey he had in the club? He squirmed and twisted for sometime and apparently in doubt said, Black & Sparks, of Richmond.

There is a city ordinance requiring the clubs to furnish the desk sergeant on the first of each month a list of new members of the club. During the preceding month, Graham's name had not been furnished as the above ordinance requires. In a few minutes after court adjourned, some boy came in the gave the chief a list of new members of the Park Driving Club among which was B. H. Graham. The list was dated December 1, 1910, and signed by L. O. Wilson, manager. I was then satisfied that B. H. Graham was not a bona-fide member of the club, and was further satisfied that Forrest got the liquor in the club because he was corroborated by Graham, and I was further satisfied that Forrest paid the money for it as he said he did, because Graham says Forrest threw the money on the table. I was then, that in the evidence which I acted upon—Forrest's character stands unimpeached, and so far as I know then and so far as I know now, his character is as good as any man's. He certainly told a reasonable story. Why should I discredit his statement? There was no motive why he should tell a lie about it. I did not have the evidence of the defense to consider along with the state's evidence, but will state frankly that if I had had it would not have changed my opinion.

I was criticized by his honor and criticized unjustly, and had it not reach the public in the one sided manner in which it has I would not have written this article. His honor in his criticism went on to say that I ought to be fair with the courts and clubs
