Olga Nethersole in "The Redemption of Evelyn Vaudry"

Two celebrities of the playwriting world have combined to provide Miss Nethersole with her latest suitable vehicle. In the first place, Henri Bernstein wrote "The Redemption of Evelyn Vaudry" in the French. In the second place, the English adaptation for Miss Nethersole's use was made by Louis N. Parker, the foremost figure in American theatricals today.

This is not to say that Mr. Parker is an American, for he isn't. He is very much English, but, as the author of "Pomander Walk" the reigning New York success, he has won an American fame that is far-reaching. Miss Nethersole's new play presents her in the character of Evelyn Vaudry, a wife of poetic leanings and romantic longings, married to a husband whose practicality has long since wearied her.

Were it not for the existence of her little son, Evelyn would have left the uncongenial surroundings of her husband's house and given herself to Jacques Foucher, a poet and author of the sort of books Evelyn most admires. Mr. David Farrell "Umbrella Man," Dead

Mr. David Farrell died this morning at 8 o'clock at his home on West Second street, of pneumonia, after a brief illness. Deceased formerly lived on South Tryon street in the frame house on the Harty lot, and was known all over two as the "umbrella man," his business being the mending and re-covering of umbrellas. He was born in Florence, Italy, in 1854 and was therefore 57 years of age. He came to America 25 years ago—1886—and to Charlotte 14 years ago. He pursued the even tenor of his life, being a quiet citizen, obedient to the laws of his adopted home. He was thrifty and taught his children to be so. He had eight children, all of whom he required, as soon as old enough, to earn something every day, if only a penny. He was a loyal member of the Catholic church and he and his household regular attendants on its services. Those who had dealings with Mr. Farrell found him straightforward and honest. The funeral arrangements will not be made until the oldest son, Mr. H. H. Farrell, of Yonkers, N. Y., arrives, which will be possibly tomorrow.
