COMMERCIAL NATIONAL BANK WILL BUILD SOON

The Commercial Bank, which two years ago bought the old express office corner, from the Carson estate, for the purpose of erecting a handsome building thereon for the bank's use, as stated at the time of purchase of the lot, will begin to tear down and build greater, within a fortnight's time.

This fact was made known day before yesterday. The bank property has a frontage on Tryon of 36 feet, and extended back on Fourth street for 135 feet. The purchase price was \$45,000. The building to be erected by the bank will cost \$150,000 or more. A building committee, consisting of Messrs. D. H. Anderson, chairman; W. S. Alexander and P. M. Brown has been appointed. This committee will go to New York and other cities to inspect the latest bank buildings and will fashion the Commercial's new home after the best designs they find. No drawings will be made, or architect decided upon, until the building committee, as named, makes its trip of inspection. The building will be a skyscraper, possibly of ten stories.

The bank will occupy the entire lower floor. The upper floors will be equipped for office and general business purposes. From the basement to the roof the building will be elegantly equipped. There will be none handsomer in the South. The site of the building is one of historic interest in Charlotte as the site of the sidewalk testifies. President Jefferson Davis was standing on the steps of the house which occupied the corner during war times making an address, when he heard of Lincoln's assassination. President Davis read the telegram and remarked "That is a calamity," of words to that effect. In the crowd was a Northern sympathizer named Bates who misinterpreted what he said, to the government at Washington, which came near causing serious trouble to Mr. Davis. The rock steps on which Mr. Davis stood is now the property of Mr. J. E. Carson, his father having owned the house where the address was made.

The Situation In Mexico

By Associated Press. El Paso, Texas, Feb. 2.—The first clash between the rebels and the federal troops sent out last night from Juarez took place before daylight between Juarez and Samalayuta, according to statements by leaders in the federal troops who retreated to Juarez this morning. They brought wounded with them and admitted that two were killed but said they were killed in exploding dynamite to wreck a bridge.

The returning troopers said they met the insurgents coming into Juarez on a train and exploded dynamite beneath a bridge which wrecked the locomotive of the train. Two of their own men were killed by the explosion and, in getting away, three more were wounded by the rebels.

It is generally believed the federal loss was heavier than the Diaz soldiers report, as many riderless horses have been coming into Juarez all forenoon and eight of them were caught in El Paso with bloodstained saddles. Six were captured at Ysleta, 12 miles below here this morning.

El Paso, Tex., Feb. 2.—Several riderless cavalry horses straggled into Juarez, opposite El Paso early this morning, indicating that there has been fighting near the city, which was practically surrounded by rebels all night.

Passengers on a train which arrived from the south after midnight say Pasqual Orozo, at the head of 1,500 men is within 20 miles of Juarez and probably will attack it some time this morning.

While the trains were marooned south of Juarez from Sunday to Wednesday, the food supply of the passengers ran out and insurgents fed them from their commissary and from beaves slaughtered on the spot. The insurgents had several wounded and these were treated by passengers sheets being torn up for bandages. Former Secretary Garfield assisted in the work.

The Juarez police today arrested Rafe Escobedo, assistant superintendent of criminals of the National Railways in Juarez and Caspar Velava night telegrapher. Juarez officers refused to state why the arrests were made.

James R. Garfield, former United States secretary of the interior, was a passenger on the train which was marooned when insurgents tore up the track Sunday, and for three days he was held up with other passengers by the insurgents. Mr. Garfield arrived last night with the train which was allowed to come into Juarez after the rebels had disembarked 30 miles east of Juarez and had begun preparations to attack the border town this morning.

Further Probing of Election Scams. By Associated Press. Danville, Ill., Feb. 2.—States Attorney Lewman this morning stated that all evidence given before the grand jury in the vote transaction investigation was written and ready so the grand jury may review it at any time and begin the work of voting indictments. This may be done during the day although there were a large number of witnesses on hand this morning the majority of them being summoned in connection with the investigation.

Frederick Jahnke, a local politician and prominent worker at the polls at every election for several years, was the first witness. He was followed by A. R. Sannels, vice-president of the Second National Bank.

It is believed that between fifty and one hundred indictments will be returned when the jury makes its first report. There appears no probability of the grand jury being able to reach final adjournment before next Wednesday.

President Cancels Engagements. By Associated Press. Washington, Feb. 2.—With the exception of his visit to Atlanta, March 10, President Taft has cancelled all the other engagements which he was making for his southern tour next month. No reason was assigned at the White House for this change of plan.

Would Provide Place For Women At Old Soldiers Home

Special to The News. Raleigh, Feb. 2.—Hawkins, of Vance, introduced in the senate a bill to create Ransom county from portions of Wake, Wilson, Johnston and Franklin.

A bill to prohibit coupons in cigarettes and tobacco packages was offered by Cotten. Thorne introduced a bill to encourage the use of non-trust goods. Many more petitions against near-liquor came into both houses today.

The house passed the Quickbill to amend the hours of labor law of 1907 so as to relieve a railroad employee from being guilty of a misdemeanor for working over 16 hours. The purpose is to give employees injured while working overtime ground for damage suits under the ruling of the supreme court in the case of Lloyd vs. Southern Railway. It claims that the present law conserves the protection of the traveling public from mistakes by overworked trainmen.

The battle bill for cities and towns to amend charters at will, adopting commission or other form of government, were reported favorable from the judiciary committee. Five hundred copies were ordered printed. Many railroad employees sent petitions today for a prohibition relief association like the Atlantic Coast Line.

A bill for an annex for wives and widows of Confederate veterans at the Soldiers' Home, was referred to the appropriations committee after favorable report from the pension committee. It carries a \$5,000 building appropriation and \$2,500 for maintenance.
