New York Cotton New York, Feb. 4.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 1/8 points in response to better cables than expected, reports of an increased trade demand in Liverpool and a covering of shorts following the sharp break of yesterday. There was considerable cotton for sale on the advance but prices were not to a net gain of about 1/8 to 1/4 points during the middle of the morning with the middle of the market around 14.67 for May, but less active business because of the continued absence of speculative operations on the long side. Private cables reported the continued buying in Liverpool but there were other unfavorable reports from Manchester and reports of the week in Fall River and New Bedford indicated no improvement in that section of the domestic mill situation.

New Orleans Cotton The market held very steady throughout the greater part of the session with more active months within a couple of points of the highest. Support came almost entirely from covering shorts, although some fresh long buying was based on late cablesgrams from Liverpool stating that the cotton had been a heavy buyer of goods here in the last half hour of trading which did not care to dry their lines over Sunday offered more freely and prices fell off 5 to 7 points from the high levels. The close was steady at a net advance of 7/8 points.

Hester's Weekly Statement. New Orleans, Feb. 4.—Secretary Hester's weekly cotton statement for the three days of February shows an increase over last year of 51,000, a decrease under the same period year before last of 61,000. For the 156 days of the season that have elapsed the aggregate is ahead of the same days of last year 1,448,000 and behind the same days year before last 730,000.

World's Visible Supply of Cotton. New Orleans, Feb. 3.—Secretary Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton shows the total visible is 5,235,524 against 5,256,196 last week, 4,793,731 last year. Of this the total of American cotton is 4,083,524 against 4,085,196 last week and 3,524,731 last year and of all other kinds, including Egypt, Brazil, India, etc., 1,152,000 against 1,717,000 last week and 1,269,000 last year.
