THE SENATE—TUESDAY—THIRTY-FIFTH DAY.

President Newland convened the senate at 11 o'clock, Rev. Mr. Farmer making the invocation.
Petitions Presented.
Hobgood, of Guilford: From citizens of Guilford favoring the Kent anti-beer bill and the Brown bill prohibiting the handling of liquor by clubs.

Thorne, of Nash, (by request): From certain citizens of Nash asking to be permitted to manufacture wine and brandy.
Johnson, of Duplin: Provide for the erection of automatic gates; also from eighteen citizens of Duplin against near beer.

Kitchin, of Halifax, (by request): From W. C. T. U. against near beer.
Sikes, of Wake: From citizens of Mark's creek township, Wake county, against the formation of Ransom county.

Haymore, of Surry: From forty citizens of Surry county against near beer and keeping liquor by clubs and to memorialize congress to pass an act that when liquor is shipped into the state it shall be under the jurisdiction of the state.

Carpenter, of Gaston: From employees of Ozart Cotton Mills, Gaston county.
New Bills Introduced.
Boydell, of Iredell: Provide for the construction of a bridge across the stream which divides Rowan and Davie counties.

Pinnix, of Yadkin: Relative to the duties of sheriff; also regulate the fees of the register of deeds of Yadkin county.
Hobgood, of Guilford: Provide for a division of the state into twenty judicial districts.

Kitchin, of Halifax: Provide for the payment of certain money by commissioners of Scotland Neck into the school fund.
Thorne, of Nash: Relief of J. L. Green, justice of the peace of Nash and to validate certain of his acts. (Placed upon the calendar by unanimous consent.)

Cobb, of Robeson: Appoint agricultural commissioner of Robeson and prescribe his duties; also to amend the road law of Robeson.
Cotton, of Pitt: Relative to the directors of the state's prison.

Sikes, of Wake: Provide for higher education of the blind; also for the relief of deaf and blind children attending school.
Starbuck, of Forsyth: Amend the charter of the Winston-Salem & Southbound Railway Company.

Relative to building a road in Jackson county.
Authorize the commissioners of Concord to issue bonds.

Authorize the commissioners of Pitt county to issue bonds to build a court house and jail.

Authorize Fayetteville to make assessment against abutting property owners in carrying on street paving.

against near beer and liquor in clubs.
Large numbers of bills came from committees with favorable reports and took places on the house calendar. The committee on liquor traffic reported favorably the bill to allow sheriffs \$40 for convictions of running distilleries and \$10 where there is no conviction. And reported unfavorably the bill to give sheriffs and policemen jurisdiction to destroy stills in adjoining counties.

The finance committee reported favorably a senate resolution to thank the state of Nevada for refusing to accept the gift of repudiated North Carolina bonds.
The committee of federal relations reported favorably a joint resolution calling on representatives in congress to support parcels post.

New Bills Introduced.
McNeill: Joint resolution relative to teaching the Bible in the public schools. Resolution of civic club relative to conservation of forests.
Kent: Pay expenses of committee in visiting the State Hospital at Morganton.

Thompson: Fix salaries of certain officers in Beaufort. Establish line between Beaufort and Washington counties.
Rudwell: Incorporate Hopkins school, Warren county.
Brown, of Stanly, by request: Revise and amend the charter of Albemarle.

Battle: Amend the revisal relative to listing poll and property for taxation.
Brown, of Jackson: Levy special tax for graded schools in Dillboro township, Jackson county.
Norman: Provide bond issue for Elks Park.

Doughton: Provide for payment of bonds of the state falling due in 1913 and for the deficit in the state treasury of \$350,000 on account of excess of appropriations of the 1909 legislature over the revenue for the succeeding two years.
Bryan: Amend the revisal relative to inspection of fertilizers.

Majetta: Amend the act of 1909 relative to establishing a card index system for grants in the state department.
Wood: Provide compulsory attendance of schools in Transylvania county.

Nease: Amend the charter of Haxell, Haywood county.
Coxe, of Randolph: Allow probating and registration of certain deeds by corporations.

Conger: Fix the time for holding courts in Wilson county. Amend revisal relative to the sale of future contracts. Provide for means of appeal by the insurance companies doing business in North Carolina.
Alfred: Amend Selma township road law. Allow Selma graded school district to issue bonds.

Hageman: Support and improve the Appalachian Training school.
Wilson, of McDowell: Appoint a justice of the peace in McDowell county.
Wooten: Pay solicitors of the state salaries instead of fees. Would be effective after March 1, 1912 on a scale of from \$1,500 salary where the fees for the previous year aggregated not over \$1,800 up to \$4,000 salary where the fees aggregated as much as \$4,200.

Conner Bill Made Special Order.
The conner bill to protect employees of railroad companies was made a special order for Tuesday, February 14. This is the bill that contains the anti-release clause that the A. C. L. Relief Association is fighting so strongly. It also allows standing in court for damage suits where there was contributory negligence.

Amend the law relating to filing reports of trustees and fiduciaries before clerks of the superior court.
As the third reading mill was rapidly grinding out bills, one every few minutes with very little discussion, there was one that sprung the word "divorce" and then there was talk in abundance. The title was "Amend the revisal as to divorce." There was calls for it to be read in full and it developed that it proposed to strike out the word "year" in section 17 of chapter 1561 of the revisal so that parties separated for five years, where there are no children shall be entitled to divorce.

Representative Williams, of Buncombe, opposed the opposition. Mr. Conger urged the passage of the bill which, he said, had received a unanimous favorable report from the judiciary committee No. 2. There was a public demand for it and it was the duty of the legislature to recognize this rather than stand on any personal views they might have individually.
Representative Battle, of Wake, spoke at length against the bill, declaring that to say that a husband and wife having no children could get divorced practically at will was disconcerting to a degree. Dr. Carr, of Duplin, also opposed the bill. The second reading resulted in a vote of 47 for and 27 against the bill. There were objections to the third reading with inability to secure suspension of rules and the bill took its place on the calendar for another day.

The house adjourned at 1.30 o'clock to 10 Wednesday morning.
