





2 cups of flour 2 teaspoonsful of baking powder.

eggs.

l glass of milk

A pinch of salt Mix milk and flour into smooth bat-

ter, beat eggs separately then pour them into batter, adding the salt. Mix all ingredients smoothly.

Half hour before the roast beef is done (allowing twenty minutes to the pound) take it from the pan, put it on platter and keep it in a warm place.

Pour off all fat, keeping just enough to make brown gravy. For the gravy, sprinkle enough flour into pan, and allow it to brown evenly, then add

enough boling water to make a nice smooth gravy. Pour ths gravy into gravy-boat, keeping it in a hot place

until ready for use, Now your the reserve fat back into roasting pan, place on top of oven and when it is at boiling point, pour the batter into it

Put the roast beef on a wire screen that fits on top of pan (screen can be purchased in any house furnishing store for about ten or fifteen cents); this allows the beef gravy to percolate


with the pudding. Then put back into the oven for half an hour.

If nstructions are closely followed you will find this a dish fit for a king, as Miss Ring had this recipe sent to her from a chef who had served years in the Guelph family.


