C., Feb. 11.—In a confession made to the officers, only a part of which will make public, Lewis West admits that he was in the house and taking part in the shooting of the Wilson officers that resulted in the death of Mr. Mumford. He says there were five other negroes in the house shooting, any one of whom may have done the killing. He says he is a member of an organized band for thieving and general lawlessness.

Howard Gould Refuses To Pay Wife's Bills

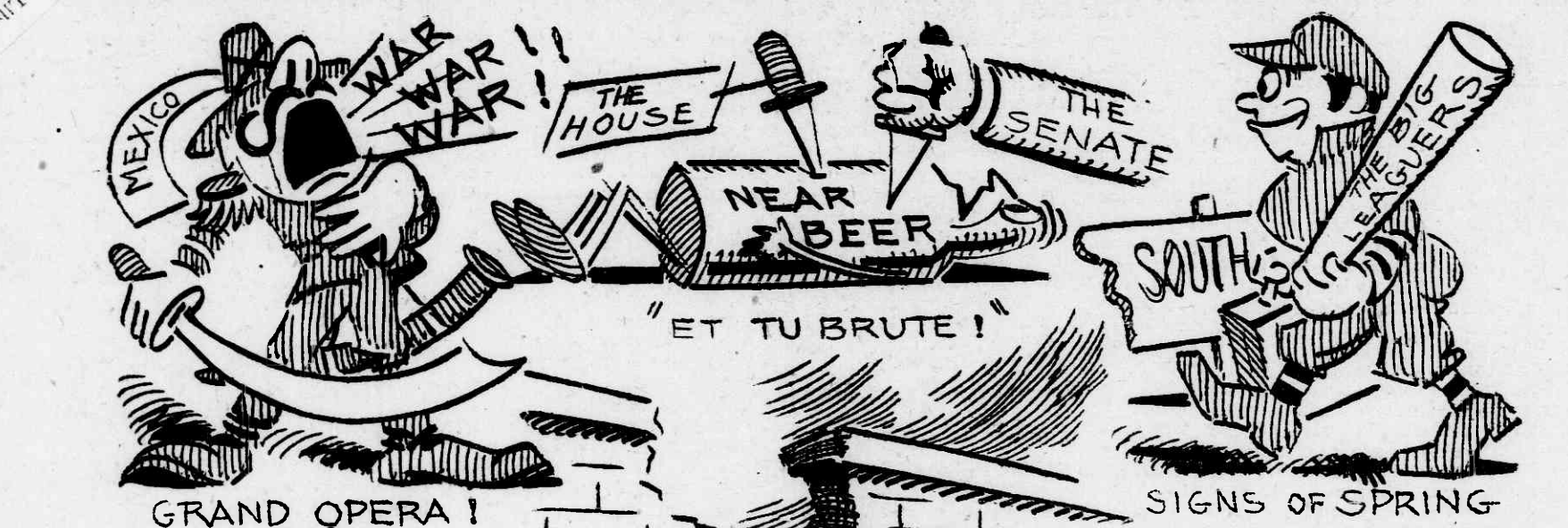

Archbishop Ryan Died In Philadelphia Yesterday Afternoon

One of Most Influential and Beloved Catholics in America Passes—Death Partially Precipitated by Overwork.

Starting As a Teacher He Rapidly Arose to Prominence—A Life Sketch—Came to America From Ireland to Accept Professorship.

Philadelphia, Feb. 11.—The Most Rev. Patrick John Ryan, archbishop of Philadelphia and metropolitan of Pennsylvania, died at 4:05 o'clock this afternoon at the archiepiscopal residence in this city.

The death of the archbishop came as a distinct shock, as the prelate was thought on the way to recovery, after making a brave fight against death. All this week he showed steady gains until last night, when his condition changed for the worse.

With Archbishop Ryan's death, the Right Rev. Edmund F. Prendergast, D. D., V. G., titular bishop of Celliae and auxiliary bishop of Philadelphia, becomes administrator of the archdiocese until a successor to the dead metropolitan is appointed by the Pope. Eleven years ago Archbishop Ryan made this provision in the event of his death.

JAS. CREELMAN MAKES REMARKS ABOUT CARNEGIE

Notable men East and West generally agree with Andrew Carnegie's views on the commerce court and public regulation of industrial combination as outlined in the New York American on Wednesday of last week.

New York, Feb. 11.—I am not surprised to read an utterance like that from Mr. Carnegie. For he, of all men in the world, is in a position to speak with authority about the unjust method through which great fortunes have been accumulated in this country and in this time.

THE LIGHT TURNED ON.

President Cassatt, of the Pennsylvania Railroad, told me once that when he issued his famous order stopping secret rebates on all lines of the Pennsylvania system, that order cost the Carnegie Company its \$3,000,000 a year, which represented the unjust advantage which Carnegie had over his competitors.

The years are creeping fast on him. There is little time left in Mr. Carnegie's life now were an honest attempt, and not a self advertisement and an attempt to change the verdict of his own career, one might attach more importance to what he says.

Think of it. Only a few years ago Judson Harmon, then attorney general of the United States, declared that the Sherman anti-trust law could not be enforced against industrial corporations like Standard Oil and the sugar trust, and other private combinations in restraint of trade.
