Yesterday In The Legislature

THE SENATE—TUESDAY—FIFTY-SIXTH DAY.

President Pro Tem Pharr convened the senate at 10 o'clock and Rev. R. T. Vann, of Meredith College, offered prayer.

New Bills Introduced.

Pharr: Provide for auditing books of corporations.

Pharr: Provide engineer assistance to counties in the construction of public roads, the state to employ an expert engineer who is to give his advice and services gratis to any county that desires.

Pharr: Amend the charter of the county of Buncombe; amend the charter of the county of Asheville; amend the charter of the county of Swain; amend the charter of the county of Wayne; amend the charter of the county of Graham; amend the charter of the county of Henderson; amend the charter of the county of Johnston; amend the charter of the county of Jones; amend the charter of the county of Lenoir; amend the charter of the county of Macon; amend the charter of the county of Madison; amend the charter of the county of Martin; amend the charter of the county of Moore; amend the charter of the county of Northampton; amend the charter of the county of Onslow; amend the charter of the county of Orange; amend the charter of the county of Randolph; amend the charter of the county of Rowan; amend the charter of the county of Salisbury; amend the charter of the county of Surry; amend the charter of the county of Swain; amend the charter of the county of Wayne; amend the charter of the county of Wilkes; amend the charter of the county of Yadkin; amend the charter of the county of Yancey.

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There were a great number of favorable reports from committees on other bills. These included: Increase pay of pensions clerk in the state auditor's office from \$900 to \$1,000; authorize issuance of bonds by special tax districts for school improvement; allow Cumberland to issue good roads bonds; allow Gastonia to issue \$70,000 bonds for improvement; allow Lee county to issue bonds for merit and improvement; allow a township in Harnett county to vote on railroad construction bonds; prohibit dynamiting fish in North Carolina streams; amend the general drainage law of 1909; amend the revision as to the appointment of guards; amend revision relative to foreign executors' bonds; amend the law relative to salting and packing fish.

New Bills Introduced.
McGill: Joint resolution for a legislative commission to investigate and report to the next general assembly as to the number of dependent widows of Confederate soldiers in North Carolina. The rules were suspended and that resolution passed and sent to the senate.
Dillard: Relative to establishment of a training school for negroes.
Rose: Resolution from Daughters of Confederacy, Mrs. Jas. N. Anderson, president, relative to Confederate veterans.
Kent: Provide better roads in Caldwell county.
Long: Amend the law of 1909 relative to revenue from circuses as it applies in Alamance county.
Tucker: Provide for the support of the A. & M. College at Raleigh.
Spainhour: Validate a deed to the Morganton of commissioners.
Carr of Durham: Fix time for holding elections in Durham.
Carr of Durham: Amend the state banking laws.
Johnston of Orange: Tax Orange county dogs.
McLaughlin: Tax dogs in Mecklenburg county.
Parham: Establish recorder's court for Thomasville.
Taylor of Vance: Amend recorder's court law for Henderson.
Sykes: Allow Union county to sell part of the court house property to the town of Monroe.
Rawles: Establish graded schools at Oriental, Pamlico county.
Rawles: Make June 3 a legal holiday.
Ross: Establish stock law in Lillington and Little River township, Harnett county.
Dillard: Provide for the election of the Graham county board of education.
Rose: Incorporate Liberty Point Monument Association, Fayetteville.
Latham: Amend the Page squirrel law. Amend the charter of Bell Haven Graded school district.
Green: Punish drunkenness in justices of the peace.
Ewart: Permit Hendersonville to vote on the question of \$100,000 bond issue for the Western Carolina Training School.

Bills Passed Final Reading.
Incorporate Chimney Rock and Hickory Nut Gaps, Transylvania county.
Fix salaries for officers of Wake county and increase the road fund. This bill came from the senate and the rules were suspended and the bill passed and ordered enrolled for ratification.
Appoint a building commission and erect a \$250,000 state administration building. Passed final reading 77 to 14 and was sent to the senate for concurrence in amendment cutting the appropriation from \$500,000 to which the senate cut it from one million dollars.
Grant a new charter to Kingston.
Establish stock law for a certain part of Northampton county.
Amend the charter of New Bern as to levying license taxes.

Messages From the Governor.
A message was received from the governor recommending a commission to represent North Carolina at the Mecklenburg Celebration July 3.
Also a message from the governor relative to North Carolina bonds that are owned by the United States government. Owing to the length of the year, but was referred to committee instead for report.
A great number of bills were sent from the senate for concurrence in passage, the reading of the titles alone consuming half hour. They were local bills principally.
The House at 2 o'clock took recess to 4:30 o'clock.

THE HOUSE—TUESDAY—FIFTY-SIXTH DAY.
Speaker Dowd convened the House in the morning at 10 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Harrell of Raleigh.
Petitions were presented by Marshall from citizens of Surry county asking for a tax on dogs and from Koonce, of Onslow, asking for a bond issue for Onslow roads.
Appropriations Committee Kills Bills.
The appropriations committee returned a number of bills to the House with unfavorable report which means that they will not be considered on the floor at all. They included: Provide anti-toxin free for all citizens of the state; provide sidewalks about the governor's mansion square; promote higher education of the blind; transfer Pickford sanitarium to the state; erect monument to the women of the Confederacy; establish legislative reference librarian; educate negroes on the subject of tuberculosis.
This committee reported favorably bills to provide an additional building at the soldiers' home; increase salary of the adjutant general; increase salary of the commissioner of labor and printing and his assistant; increase the salary of the state librarian; increase the appropriation to the state

Primary Bill a Special Order.
Senator Brown endeavored to have the senate go into a committee of the whole to consider the revenue act, but Senator Hobgood's bill providing for a state primary law for both political parties was taken up as a special order and debated for two hours until recess for dinner, no action being taken. Senator Hobgood made an earnest, exhaustive argument for the bill, expressing the firm belief that such a measure would prove the means of party purity and protect the political parties from the participation in primaries of men who are without conviction or character, thus allowing the people to say who should occupy the offices. He was willing to trust the people's fidelity and patriotism.
Senator Sikes advocated the bill in a brief speech, while Senator Pharr stated that the democratic convention had not declared for a primary law and he was not willing for this law to be passed when the conventions have not asked for it, but he believed the question should first be presented to the convention to secure its endorsement. He would vote for a primary law for any particular county, but thought it would be very unwise to pass such a law for the entire state.
Senator Garner championed the bill, declaring that the people of the state are demanding a more effective and efficient method of selecting their party candidates and that they are tired of the obsolete and centralized custom of conventions and disjointed primaries. He believed the tendency of the whole nation is towards direct primaries, giving the people the right to select their favorites by popular vote, free from the pernicious and dangerous influences of machines, bosses and rings, such as control the republican party in this state, he asserted. A state wide primary for both parties would mean a purification of politics and result in bringing the people nearer their public servants and the public servants more responsive to the will of the people. He would not be willing to eliminate the republican party from the provisions of the bill, which Senator Hobgood stated was patterned after the Oregon law. Senator Haymore contended that it was simply the Australian ballot system.

The debate continued with increasing interest. Senator Long strongly opposed the bill. Senator Stogdill, the republican leader of the senate, also opposed the bill, saying the legislature cannot afford to pass such a law. He favored a primary to correct existing abuses, but was against this particular bill, which he thought could be amended to meet the needs. Senators Barnes, Hicks and Ivie made speeches for the bill and others engaging in the debate were Senators Kithin, Brown, Hobgood and Pharr.
The discussion was cut off by a motion to take a recess until 8:30 tonight.
