Fashion Letter

New York, March 1.

The present style of short jacket with a coat and skirt costume absolutely precludes any possibility of ever wearing the coat of the suit with one of the other gowns in the outfit, and makes essential the providing of a long wrap in the wardrobe decided upon for the first days of spring. When it is within the range of the dress allowance to buy as fancy dictates, the well-dressed woman will select at least two or perhaps as many as five or six wraps of different weights and styles for her spring costumes, but she who must order with greater care will purchase a long semi-fitted wrap of black satin or lightest weight cloth fashioned in such a model that it will be suitable for day or evening wear as occasion demands.

Three-piece gowns of tussah, rajah and all such materials will be, of course, in evidence this year, for the three-piece costume is too useful a style of dress to be abandoned lightly by Dame Fashion. At the same time a jacket is not now considered an obligatory part of the gown provided for spring weddings and receptions, and a smart afternoon gown with a long cloak of satin or cloth which can be worn with this dress or any other rock in the outfit at will, is often found to make the best investment.

The New Eton. Of course, in the matter of coats, no style departure has come with quite such startling suddenness as the revival of the Eton jacket. Ever since early last fall the fashion authorities have been predicting the return of the waistline coat, but mildy has accepted the prediction with a grain of salt until within the past few weeks and now she suddenly finds that her neighbor and her neighbor's daughter are wearing Eton coats. So she immediately procures one of the new models and registers a mental vow that "next time" she will not disregard her modiste's advice.

In the first illustration is shown one of the smartest of the new short coats. It was part of a pongee suit designed for a trip to Bermuda. The body and sleeves and coat were cut in one—a significant indication of the continued popularity of the pongee blouse. The closing was outlined with band of blue satin and this material was used to trim the skirt and for the cuffs. The long half-fitted wraps fall either quite to the hem of the skirt or are but a few inches shorter, while in addition to the Eton, there are also separate jackets trimmed fancifully and reaching no further than the hips, but for separate coats there are no in-between lengths. In some models the back is plain, in others there is a high Empire belt of soft folded or rolled satin. The front of this coat generally fastens over loosely with a large buckle or flat button about the waistline. The majority of these wraps are fashioned with the sleeve in one piece with the rest of the material, and it is necessary to leave the arm opening wide so that the most delicate sleeve will not be crushed beneath it. Sailor Collars. The sailor collar in all imaginable widths and lengths is the favorite finish for all coats, and even a long wrap shows no exception to this rule. On a black satin coat, white is most often used for collar and cuffs, but a bright shade of blue or a deep gold or yellow are seen on a number of the newest models, and when the lining corresponds in color, the effect is undeniably smart. When the coat is of a decided shade, as sapphire blue, scarlet, green or one of the fashionable tints of purple or mauve, black satin collar and cuffs are sometimes seen, while again a lighter shade of the color of the wrap is employed and it is difficult to say which is the more effective. It is possible to fashion an exceedingly smart wrap in one of the always good sleeveless models at ridiculously small cost from a piece of the new fleece-back satins. These wraps have only large openings for the arms, the material stitched together again beneath the opening in such a manner as to really form sleeves. The coat is

formed of two lengths of material fastened down the center and at each side to form sleeves, from a pattern that the veriest novice can copy, and when bordered at the top and about the end of the sleeve openings with a band of passementerie braid or a fold of satin, will make as effective a wrap as could be desired. A lining will give warmth, but if the cloth is of sufficiently heavy quality no lining will be obligatory. As a black coat can be worn with a gown of any color, a black wrap lined with a shade to correspond with the gown with which it is intended to wear it most often is strongly to be advised.

The Length of Sleeves. As a wrap is intended primarily as a means of warmth or at any rate protection for the gown worn beneath, it is well to have some means of fastening it close to the throat, although for daytime it may be opened entirely over the front of the waist. Short sleeves are once more in vogue for all elaborate dresses, but for a wrap sleeves of full length are certain to be most practical. Quite distinct from the long satin coat, but an equally necessary part of the outfit, is a long heavy ulster for traveling or motoring. Not every one is so fortunate as to be the possessor of a motor car, but nowadays it is necessary to be prepared for an occasional ride in the automobile of some more fortunate friend. Rattine, trimmed with black satin is much in fashion, but genuine English and Scotch ulsters with loose backs and long shoulder seams, the coats fashioned of rough water-proof tweed, are the favorite cloaks for rough wear. Homespuns from the lightest, most expensive qualities to the very cheapest grades are the favorite materials

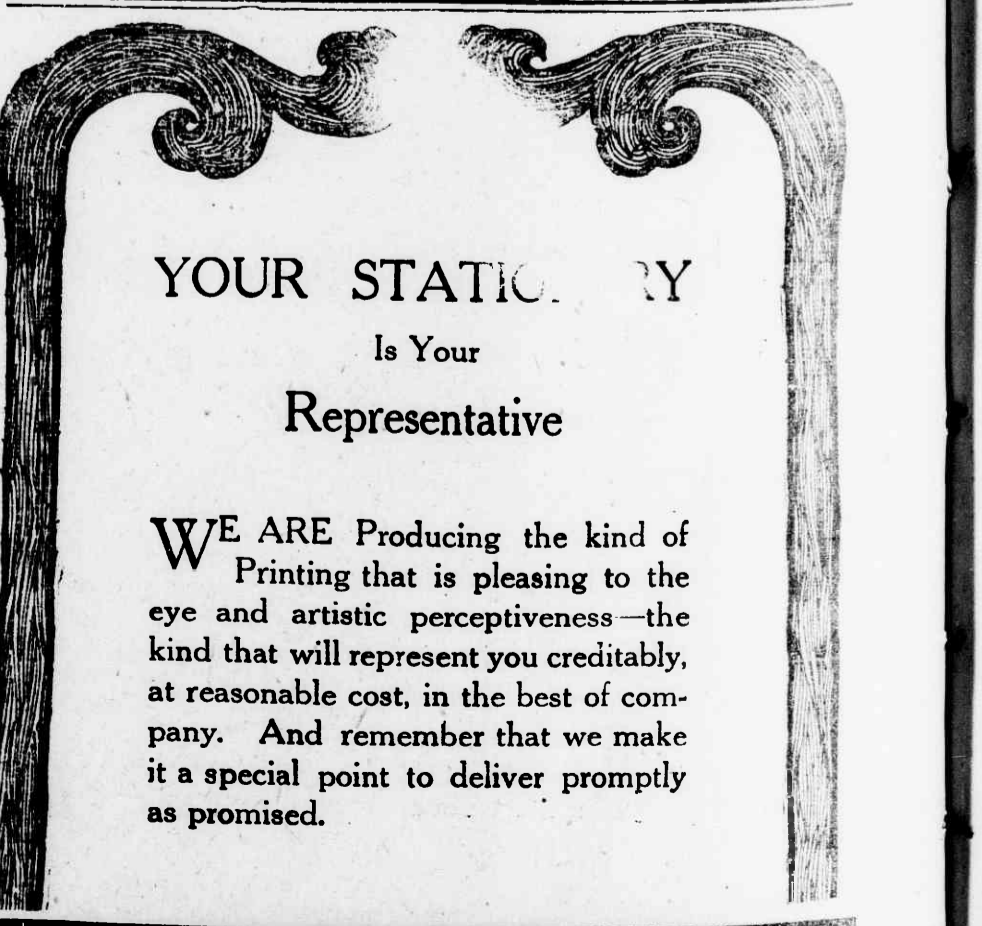
