Railroad Begins Retrenchment

Toledo, O., March 2.—A reduction of ten per cent in wages, curtailment of the number of employees and the working hours from ten to eight has been ordered for the locomotive department of the Lake Shore Railroad in Toledo. The order, which was effective this morning, involves a pay-roll approximately \$19,000 per month and the pay envelopes of about 95 machinists and boiler makers.
