"Matinee Idol"—Great. A ticket to "A Matinee Idol" as it appeared at the Academy of Music last evening, represented transportation to that greatest of all resorts, Happyland, and insured the traveler that he would be in the merriest of company. "A Matinee Idol" is a song comedy, and as that, is a great success. There is not a line in it that is not clean comedy and all of the musical numbers were good. Mr. DeWolf Hopper had the top part and he more than lived up to his reputation for being a comedian of great ability. When the announcement was made that DeWolf Hopper was to appear in the city the people were told that he was a great exponent of clean comedy on the stage and they went there to see just that.

Miss Louise Dresser had the leading feminine comedy part and her work added greatly to the general excellence of the entertainment. Miss Dresser is a beautiful woman with a charming personality and a wonderful capacity for fun. Her interpretation of the comedy lines was marvelous and her song reading is simply irresistible. Her every appearance was the signal for applause from her enthusiastic audience, and buoyed up by this show of enthusiasm she was at her delightful best. The supporting company was way above the standard and ably carried out their part in the funmaking. Little Mr. George Mack as Jimmie Grant, was well received as was Miss Dorothy Webb as Lucy Gray. Miss Gray has an excellent voice and her vocal numbers were certainly well liked. Her best song was "Little Lady in the Moon." The absence of chorus men was a good feature and the chorus was well voiced, pretty and had real singing voices.

Mr. Hopper made a certain talk after the first act that was one of the funniest things in the entire performance. He kept the audience laughing from the time he came on the stage until he left and put it more in his debt than it was before. There were numerous musical numbers woven into the plot of the show and all of them were good. The best comedy was brought out by Miss Dresser and Mr. Hopper in their parody on Madam X. That was a scream from the first to the last and gave both of them a chance to display their rare ability as entertainers. "A Matinee Idol" is a good two hour amusement and was enjoyed as that. Not a word is spoken that is offensive and there is a wealth of good comedy and music all through the evening.

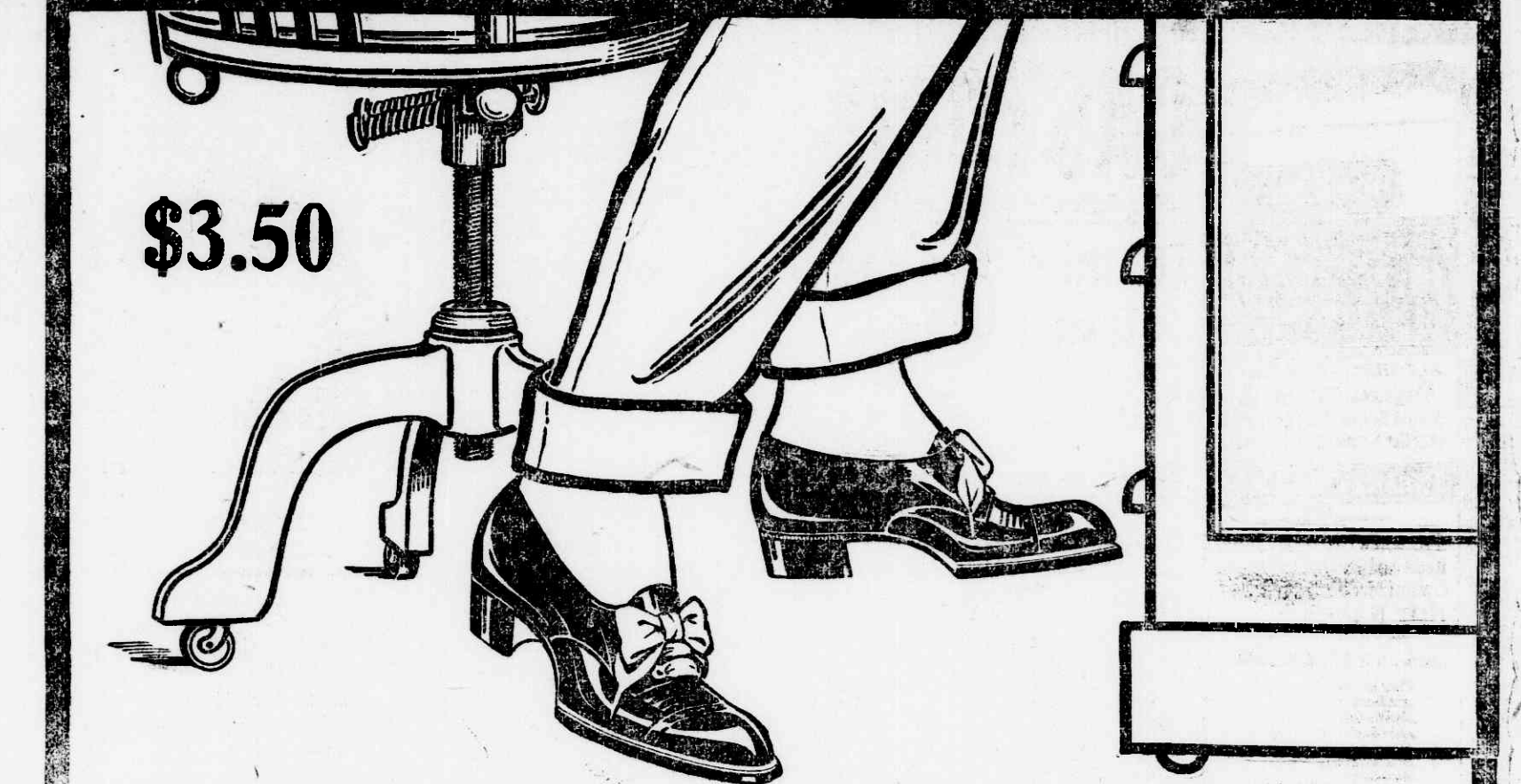
Cities Working For Association Members

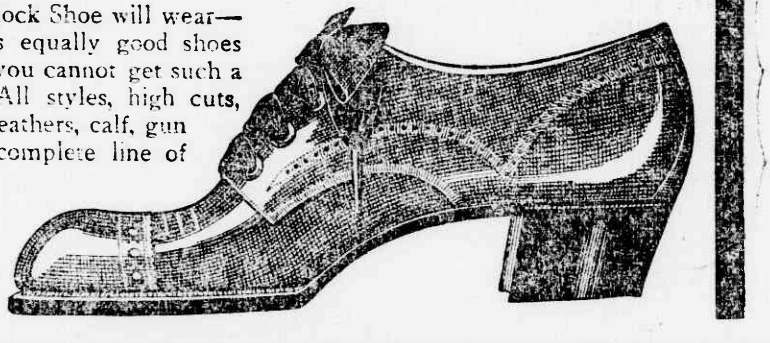

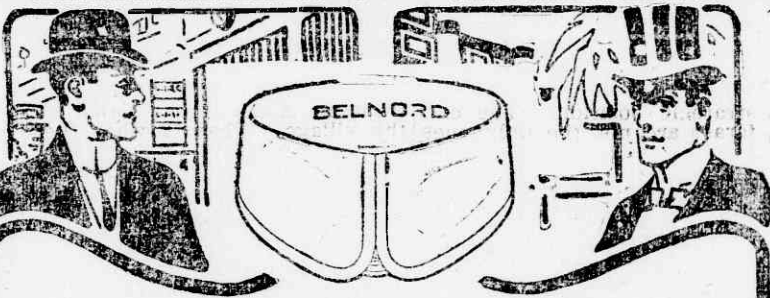
